MANUFACTURERS FREE-TRADE LEAGUE.

The interest taken by manufacturers in all parts of the country in the success of the Manufacturers' Free-Trade League is a striking indication of the progress of economic thought among intelligent manufacturers in recent years. Time was when politicians were able to rally nearly every manufacturer to their support by promises of large profits and sure prosperity, but experience of high tariffs on raw materials and of markets glutted with goods too dear for either the home or foreign market has disclosed the fallacies of protectionist logic. It has been seen just where the shoe pinches and how futile it is to expect permanent benefits from a tariff system vantages offered in another. Manufacturers-or the more far-seeing of their secure freedom for their industry, and forth their objects in these terms:

"1. To foster, disseminate and give effect in every possible way, direct and indirect, to free-trade principles. 2. To demonstrate to our brother manufacinjure or destroy them. 3. To demonstrate to the people that the independent and self-supporting manufacturers in the United States, representing all lines of industry, have no need of protection, so called, but believe that such a policy entails unjust and burdensome taxation. 4. To create a national organization that will, upon all occasions, combat the monopolies and trusts which have been made possible by the protective tariff system. The utterances on the tariff question

from manufacturers who are pushing the league are decidedly crisp and forcible. A manufacturer at Burlington, Iowa, puts the matter in a nutshell as follows: "WLy should manufacturers have 'protection' when labor has no 'protection?' Free trade would protect manufacturers from themselves. 'Protection' stimulates them to overproduction for the home market, which is soon glutted with goods, and then the factories shut down and the work people starve. Free trade would give this country a large export trade and steady employment-just what working people need. All living expenses would be much less and the whole country the gainer." Another manufacturer, of Bradford,

"We are in favor of absolute free trade, believing it to be the only policy that is just to all classes; also believing that manufacturers as a class would be benefited by an increase of commerce which would follow the freeing of foreign exchange. We believe that all who ask for protection on their product seek to rob the consumer and ask the government to assist them in so doing. We consider protectionists as paupers eccking to live off of others' industries, and to profit by others' losses."

The idea is confidently expressed that protection is an obstacle to production; that it deprives manufacturers of cheap raw materials and consumers of cheap goods: that by making our manufacturers too expensive for export it deprives us of foreign markets, limits our

FARMERS' INSTITUTES.

Views of Mr. Wm. S. Powell, of this Coun ty, who was President of the Large and Widely-Noticed Farmers' Institute Re\* cently held at Beltsville, Prince George's County, Md.

In conversation on the subject of a State appropriation for Farmers' Institutes, Mr. Powell said: "As soon as Prof. Silvester, the president of the Maryland Agricultural College, offered the resolution at the Beltsville Institute. favoring State aid for holding Farmers' Institutes in all the counties, I immediately recognized that such meetings would be productive of great good, and it is but just that the farmers should have some of the money back which they so liberally pay to the State in taxes, for dissemination of information which would assist them in learning how to make their burdens as citizens less heavy, and their comforts as individuals greater. "If I quote correctly the report of the State Bureau of Statistics, recently published, says: In the State we have, approximately, 7,500 manufactories, using a capital of \$119,000,000, employing

107,000 people who carn \$41,000,000, working up material costing \$92,000,000, whose products have a value of \$172,000,-000. If you will add the wages and material together you will have \$133,-500,000. Deducting this sum from the products (\$172,000,000.) you will have left \$37,500,000, or about 30 per cent. gross profits on the capital invested. On the same basis, when we look into agricultural matters, it will be found that we have about 40,000 farms, or over five times as many farms as factories. These farms, including live stock and implements, all of which pay taxes (there being no exemptions as there are for certain causes in the stocks of corporations,) are valued at \$201,000,000 and they only produce \$26,000,000 in values of all kinds. And to make this insignificant amount it takes the enormous capital of over two hundred million dollars, and the combined work of over two hundred and two thousand families, or with double the capital and at least five times the people the agricultural classes are only making about one-sixth as much money as the manufacturing classes. This stupendous difference in favor of of the latter over the former can not be traced to over-production, because, with the exception of a few trucking crops and fruits, Maryland consumes more than she produces. Then what is the cause? I frankly believe it is legislation. Any intelligent man looking at the work of our Legislatures for the past iwenty years will find that all their efforts have been towards fostering the corporate and manufacturing interests, and com-

paratively nothing has been done for the farmers who pay most of the taxes. Nor is this to be wondered at when we look at the composition of our legislative bodies. How few intelligent farmers they contain; mostly composed of propurifier, Ayer's Sarsaparilla is the kind fessional men and others directly inmost in favor with the medical profes terested in what is known as "business." The farmers' interests must naturally under these conditions, suffer. know what they are doing or the ruts

annually for two years would be a wise appropriation to be made for this work and I feel that two years' experience provided a practical, energetic man, having agricultural knowledge, (not a broken down politican,) is put in charge of the work under the proposed board of agriculture and immigration, that Farmers' Institutes will become a permanent feature of our State and its agricultural classes greatly benefitted by them. "If this plan is considered the proper

one, now is the time to commence the preliminary work. Let the farmers hold neetings and the first resolution they pass should be that part of each delegaion to the Legislature from the country districts shall be composed of intelligent farmers, and also resolve not to vote for any delegate who will not commit himself, without reservation, to such an appropriation. But do not stop there Follow the delegates to the legislative halls and make them fulfill their promises to their constituents. No farmer Governors in name, nor farmer representatives in occupation do we want, but live representatives of the agricultural sections, who are not ashamed of the hayseed in their hair, nor afraid to pass or sign bills because of their effect upon the monied interests."

Mr. Powell, although largely engaged n business, is a progressive agriculturist, iving on his farm, "Llangollen," at Annapolis Junction, Howard county.
