THE GOOD THAT ONIONS DO.

One of the healthiest vegetables, if no the healthfest, grown is the onion; yet, strange to say, but few people use it as liberally as they should. Boiled onions used frequently in a family of children will ward off many of the diseases to which the little ones are subject. The principal objection to the promiscuous use of this vegetable is that the odor exhaled after eating is so offensive. A cup of strong coffee taken immediately after eating is claimed to be excellent in couneracting this effect. Although for a day or so after eating onions the breath may have a disagreeable odor, yet after this ime it will be much sweeter than be-

Pieces of the Cross. The fact may not be known to many that there are in New York certain portions of the true cross of Christ which are of undoubted authenticity. It seems extraordinay that these bits of wood could have been preserved down through the ages for nearly 1,900 years. And yet the historical records, as explained further on, make it plain that it is not so surprising after all.

In the Church of St. Francis Navier in that city, is a small piece of the wood of the true cross. This will be shown on Easter Day, as is the custom in the churches of Europe which posses bits of the cross. At the Cathedral in that city is a relic of the true cross, which is exposed for public veneration on Good Friday. This relic is in a crystal and gold casket, set with precious stones, and forms the center of a handsome altar cross. The French Church of St. John the Baptist, in East Seventy-sixth street, also possesses a relic of the cross. Every church which is the custodian

of a portion of the cross is also in possession of a document bearing the seal of the Vatican, and testifying to the authenticity of the relic. The relic itself is most carefully sealed in an airtight receptacle.-N. Y. Exchange. How Snow Stops Bullets.

snow forts .- New York World. How Electricity Kills. The very interesting and valuable experiments which Dr. A. M. Bleile, of the Ohio State University, has been making with regard to the effects of electric shocks upon animal organism have reached a stage where a working theory can be predicated upon the results obtained. This theory is a complete departure from that most commonly accepted. It has been supposed that the cause of death in cases of electrocution was the breaking down of the tissues. But the elaborate experiments which Proessor Bleile has made during the last nonth or more leave no doubt in his mind that death results from a very different cause. He has found by experimenting with a large number of dogs that an electric shock of sufficient in tensity to cause death results in a contraction of the arteries, so that they refuse to perform their functions. This throws the blood from the veins upon he heart, and virtually drowns the operation of that organ.—Cleveland


