DRAFT DOGS IN BELGIUM.

In this country the dog is, in nine cases out of ten, the master of the man. In continental Europe, the reverse is the case the dog there being too often the martyr of the man. In Belgium is this especially noticeable, for one of the first things that impresses the stranger in Brussels is the immense number of dogs employed in drawing barrows and small carts about the streets. In that city alone over ten thousand dogs are so engaged, and the total number of draught dogs in the whole country is probably

not less than fifty thousand. Generations of servitude have made the Belgian dog a race apart. For his l size be is said to possess the greatest pulling power of any animal, four times his own weight being considered a load well within his power. Taking his average weight as half a hundred weight, this means that something like five thou sand tons are daily dragged about by canine labor in Belgium.

The economic importance of the Bel gian dog and his inability to give effective expression to his own grievances have caused the Royal Society for the Protection of Animals to undertake an agitation for the amelioration of his lot. It is urged that the animals are frequently overloaded, and often cruelly treated and that in many cases they are given no opportunity for resting when the cart or barrow is not actually in motion. Among the reforms demanded are (1) the abolition of the whip, and severe penalties against the brutal practice of kicking tired-out dogs; (2) the raising of the minimum shoulder height for dogs of burden from twenty twenty twenty. burden from twenty to twenty-two inches; (3) a penalty against drunkenness when in charge, and against the employ-ment of children and drivers, and (4) the compulsory arrangement of harness and shafts so as to permit the animals to lie down when the vehicle is at rest. Al though there is no demand as yet, by either the dogs or their biped friends, for an eight hour law, there can be no doubt that the adoption of these planks in the platform of canine emancipation will be hailed with gratitude throughtont weary dogdom in the domain King Leopold.—Philadelphia Record.

Blondin and His Rope, His baggage when on tour consists of the following: A main rope of 800 feet; circumference, 6½ inches; weight, 800 pounds, twenty-eight straining ropes, fifty guide ropes, eighty tying bars-the average weight, not including poles, being five and a-half tons. The freight of his fixings, including, we suppose, a huge traveling tent, which can encombetween Southampton and Melbourne. About three days are consumed in making his preparations, with the aid of a dozen assistants. The due adjustment of his rope is his principal care, and he superintends every detail.

In a fragment of autobiography writ ten some years ago, Blondin tells us that the rope he generally used was formed with a flexible core of steel wire covered with the best Manilia hemp, about an inch or three-quarters of an inch in diameter, several hundred yards in length, and costing about £100. A large windlass at either end of the rope served to make it taut, while it was sup ported by two high poles. His balance ing poles, of ash wood, vary in length and are in three sections, and weigh from thirty-seven to forty-seven pounds. He is indifferent as to the height at which he is to perform. Blondin has never confessed to any nervousness on the rope, and while walking he generally looks eighteen or twenty feet ahead and whistles or hums some snatch of a song. The time kept by a musical band has frequently aided him in preserving his balance. Blondin is something of both carpenter and blacksmith, and is able to make his own models and fit up his own apparatus.—Chamber's Journal

Birds and the Farmer. Dr. C. Hart Merriam, chief of the divis-

ion of ornithology of the Agricultural Department, has just made a report on the results of his examination of the contents of the stomachs of hawks, owls, crows, blackbirds, and other North American birds that are supposed to be the enemies of farmers. He shows that the popular notions about hawks and birds, for the slaughter of which many States gave bounties, are altogether erroneous. Ninety-five per cent of their food was found to be field mice, grasshoppers, crickets, etc., which were infinitely more injurious to farm crops than they. The charge against crows i that they eat corn and destroy eggs, poultry, and wild birds. Examination shows that they eat noxious insects and destructive animals, and that although 23 per cent of their food is corn, it is mostly waste corn picked up in the fall and winter. With regard to eggs, it was found that the shells were eaten to very limited extent for the lime. Crows eat also ants, beetles, caterpillars, bugs flies, grubs, etc., which do much damage The cuckoos are also found to be yer useful birds.—Rochester Herald.

The Sulky with One Wheel. It paced the mile in 1.58‡, but this while a phenomenal performance, does not count in these calculations, for a team could not be used to the one-wheel sulky under any circumstances. If, as it is claimed, the one-wheel will be as much faster over the ordinary bicycle sulky as that invention was over the high-whee type, a straight trotting, or pacing, record under two minutes may be expected.
