Hore Impressive Than Niagara, More There are many wonders within the limits of the Yellowstone park, but of them all there is nothing so wonderful as the Grand canyon of the Yellowstone river. One can at no season of the year view this tremendous gorge without a sense of awe at the work of the Titanic elemental forces which have hollowed it out of the enduring granite of the hills. There is an impression of unspeakable solemnity conveyed by this giant spectacle, and no American looks upon it without a sense of absolute humility and insignificance. The thought, the meaning, the expression, of the Grand canyon is something the human mind is unable at first to grasp. There is no coup d'œil possible there. There is no definite thought resultant upon any single glance at the Grand canyon, no matter how comprehensive or how per-The Grand canyon refuses to be compassed at a glance. It demands faithful,

patient, humble study. More impressive than Niagara, more mighty than the sea, consistently with that high character more beautiful than the Alps, it offers to the visitor an enigma capable of solution only after long and reverent acquaintance. To attempt to see the Grand canyon in an hour or a day is ridiculous. To attempt to see it as one of a crowd is a wrong to one's best self. To study it hour after hour, to drink in with unabated zest the same view time after time, day after day, to see the mountain lights and shades give a thousand different expressions to the face of nature and to learn some new feature even at the last visit to some familiar point of view-these are the things which make the visitor and observer at first curious, then wondering and then, we may almost say, worshipful. Not even the most blase world trotter has ever been heard to express disappointment with the Grand anyon of the Yellowstone, and it is singular to notice the universally respectful and subdued comment upon it by even the most casual and flippant visitor.

There have been very few persons who have seen the canyon in winter time, and it may be well believed we made the most of our rare privilege. It was risky work approaching the great walls on the skis, but we managed to get to different points commanding full view of the main portion of the canyon and of both the Great falls and the Upper falls of the Yellowstone. The Great falls were incased in vast white columns of ice on each side, and from them arose a noble pillar of dense white vapor. Never again shall we see a more remarkable sight than that thus presented to us on that clear winter morning .- Philadelphia Press.

Round as Giotto's O.

Giotto was a famous painter, sculpto: and architect of the latter part of the thireenth century. He was a son of a poor shepherd, but the attention of the great master, Cimabue, having been attracted to the boy by a drawing the lad had made on a fragment of slate, the young artist's fame spread rapidly throughout southern Europe. In those days it was customary for the popes to send for the noted men o their realm, more for the purpose of grati fying their desires to see such celebrities than anything else. Giotto was no exception to the rule. No sooner had the young Tuscan become famous than Pope Boniface VIII invited him to Florence. When young Giotto arrived at the gates of the pope's private grounds, according to the account, the guard halted him and inquired concerning his mission.

The artist made the matter plain, but the guard was not satisfied with the explanation, frequently interrupting Giotto's explanatory remarks with, "I know he must be a much larger and distinguished looking person than yourself," and: "Giotto is a famous painter. By your walk I would take you to be a shepherd." Finally, upon demanding evidence of the artst's skill, the latter stooped and traced a perfect O in the dust of the path with his inger. Any one who has ever attempted the feat of drawing a perfect circle "offhand" well knows how difficult it is. It is needless to add that the artist was forthwith ushered into the presence of the supreme pontiff, and that since that time Rounder than Giotto's O' has been a favorite byperbole to indicate "impossible perfection."-St. Louis Republic.

It is usually dark and gives a very rich and handsome appearance to the whole interior, which is dull and dark-owing to the want of windows—until the myrlads of lanterns are lighted. The carving is sometimes gilded, and sometimes the wood is left in a state of nature with a high polish. Doorways are often half filled in with it. Again, a low, deep frieze is seen all around the room. The women's apartments particularly are decorated with the carved work. What ever can be imagined as contributing to pleasure and the support of luxury is to e found in the secluded quarters devoted to the women.—Philadelphia Times.
