COAL MINING UNDER THE SEA.

An Enterprise with Some Novel Features in New South Wales.

It is proposed to carry into effect a project which aims at bringing from far below the lowest depths of Sydney harbor, New South Wales, the coal which geologists had predicted would be found there, and which has actually been tested by diamond drill borings. Transport, in a recent issue, contains a very flattering account of the scheme now being floated on the London market, from which the following particulars are obtained:

Important coal fields have been developed both north and south of Sydney at Newcastle and Bull—but up to the present the intervening area has been left practically untouched, although plainly shown on the government geological maps of forty years ago. The unquestionable advantages that would follow the opening up of coal mines in the very heart of the capital of the colony have led to the formation of a company, and indeed our contemporary takes a most sanguine interest in the outlook. Sydney is an important shipping port, where the lines of many steamship companies converge, and the coal of the district in question is in demand for bunker use and export.

The borings will be made under the superintendence of the Miners' Department of New South Wales, partly on account of geological interest and partly on the very practical ulterior view of raising revenue. The seam was found within thirty feet of the depth predicted by the geologists, and the coal is of a deep. For 1500 feet the borings passed through compact sandstone, claimed to be impermeable to water. The seam itself is 10 feet thick, and is 6 feet thick, and is 4 feet below the surface. The shafts to be sunk will be within 200 feet of deep water, so that the situation will be unique, the saving on cost of transportation from the nearest access now working being about 75 cents to \$1 a ton.

The parent company has secured a surface site of small extent, but has concessions over 400 acres below ground (and water), and it is expected that several other colonies will be started, for which there is said to be room. There is nothing extraordinary in mining under water, as implied in our statements. This has been done on the Cornish coast and in the copper and iron mines of Michigan at Silver Islet, Lake Superior, and the opening of these colliers in a large shipping port, with a delivery from the shaft month directly into vessels alongside, is something which our British states at Washington and British Columbia can rival. It is also proposed to utilize the smaller coal, screened from the bunker coal, for a large electric installation and also to make use of the established local smelting works.—Philadelphia Record.

MISFORTUNES OF BIRDS.

I have noticed in a New York paper an account of a strange misfortune that happened to an English sparrow at the building of the Edison laboratory, Orange, N. J. The bird became entangled in a twine used in the construction of its nest, and met its death by hanging. This has reminded me of a similar incident that occurred to a bird last summer, near Bowling Green, Ky. It was a common or crow blackbird, and was seen hanging by the neck from the limb of a tall tree over hanging the road. Whether in doing with a long grass or string it became entangled with it or in what way it got caught in the nose and met its death, is a matter of conjecture. A few weeks ago a weaver bird has come under my notice. The bird, a hairy woodpecker, was seen on a tree trunk, and though a stone was thrown toward it to see if it, it remained in the same position. On going near it, I found that the bill had been driven into the tree with such force that the bird could not extricate it, and had hung there for some time. I have also heard from a friend of an interesting history of a mockingbird. It was quite a young bird when purchased from a negro bird catcher, and it was soon discovered to have sore feet. These were swollen twice the natural size, and though efforts were made to relieve this, it was only after it had lost several of its toes—two front toes on one foot and one on the other—that the feet were finally healed. After this it moulDED, losing about all its feathers at one time. Its feet were so sore, that it would hop till it reached the food, it would hop follow the side of the cage till it reached the water. It soon learned, however, to gauge distances, and would fly to the perch with its feet in the air, and when, so strange to say, this poor maimed bird, lame and blind, developed into one of the finest of singers—Sadie P. Price in Amer. Naturalist.

Stenographers in Congress.

The perfection of stenography is exhibited by the work of the official reporters in the Senate and House of Representatives, says the Washington Post. The men who take the records of the proceedings of the two branches of Congress are the pick of the country. A speaker is too swift for them, and the member in a field they run rolling debates, when the questions and answers follow quick upon each other, it is the wonder and envy of many. The work in the House is considered much more difficult than in the Senate, but in the former body the reporter is to a certain extent excusable for mistakes and failure to get all of the proceedings. During a particularly turbulent scene, such as the House often witnesses, if he is unable to catch what is said, owing to the din, he can cover it up by publishing in the Congressional Record "Prior in the House." In the legislative body at the other end of the Capital, however, it is different. The Senate is a dignified body, and Senatorial courtesy prohibits more than three months' speaking at a time. In addition, the reporter is supposed to catch every word spoken, and has no excuse for a failure in making a full and perfect report. The reporters work in relays, each man reporting for a certain number of relays in the House being much shorter than in the Senate. One reporter is on the floor at a time, but when an important debate is on, and when matters are liable to become exciting, it is the custom to have two on hand.

How to Keep Lemons Fresh.

It is not generally known that lemons may be easily and almost indefinitely preserved under glass. Some, one year, were purchased on the Fourth of July and by way of experiment, each one was put under an inverted goblet. Thus kept from the air they were finally removed on Christmas day in perfect condition, and as juicy as ever.—New York Press.
