LET US REASON TOGETHER. There is no disguising the fact that the hearing issue at the Democratic primaries in our state has been and will continue to be Mr. Gorman. With the enemies of Mr. Gorman every other consideration is being sunk and the only cry heard from them is "Down with Mr. Gorman." This opposition is composed principally of two elements, namely, some who are really ardent tariff reformers and claim that no good Democrat should brook the Wilson tariff bill disapproval, while the other are disgruntled from not having received office.

On the other hand it is believed that a majority of the Democratic party after an unbiased study of the Senior Senator, especially since the tariff agitation began, are unwilling to enter into any such crusade, in fact are willing to accord Mr. Gorman a foresight which seems almost prophetic.

The Times is willing to yield the point that many of the men now pursuing Mr. Gorman are sincere tariff reformers; that they are sincere and rendered irreconcilable over the miscarriage of what they regarded as a cherished tenet of their political faith. Most of these men use as an argument that if the present tariff law is booming the country they should we have more of it? This is on a par with the reasoning of a man, who being benefitted by one dose of medicine, kept on taking it until it killed him. The action of the Senate, with Mr. Gorman as the leader, was a grand check to legislation which had a large element of uncertainty in it. Why not let well enough alone and pay honor to whom honor is due? The whole country applauded Mr. Gorman for his assiduous work when the Force Bill hung over the country as a pall, threatening us with a tyranny under which Maryland and every southern state would have wilted. All are acquainted with this piece of our national history and it needs no further comment.

So-called tariff reformers, sincere and insincere, have made this unpleasant issue, and it remains to be seen whether Mr. Gorman is to be sacrificed.

If there ever was a propitious time for Republicans to turn Democrats it is now. The country is well on the way to prosperity and it can be attributed to the far seeing men of the Democratic party who took in the real situation and formulated what the country most needed at this time. To vote the Republican ticket means a change of policy, something the country does not want, nor doesn't need.

We would say to our dissatisfied friends, look before you leap. Mr. Gorman has rendered distinguished service to his party and the country, and while the country can get along without either Mr. Cleveland or Mr. Gorman yet it must be admitted, after sober reflection, that the one is not far behind the other in putting the Democratic party on its present solid footing. Nor do we believe that Mr. Cleveland and Mr. Gorman are at loggerheads at this time. The former has too much honesty and sterling regard for his country's good to attempt to belittle the latter, nor has any of his late utterances indicated dissatisfaction with the present condition of affairs.

The Times has not lost faith in Mr. Gorman nor will it until we see that he has passed the line which marks the difference between the Democratic and Republican parties.

Down Mr. Gorman and the result will be another "bloss" of mediocre ability and after the State has gone permanently Republican a few thousand Democrats will retire to obscure places to vigorously kick themselves, and Sanbo will occupy a distinguished position.

Mr. Gorman has never been more coarsely assailed than Mr. Cleveland, and the abuse the former is receiving does not in the slightest indicate that he is deserving of it, and we repeat it if the two men are not now occupying common ground they soon will be, for common sense and patriotism will demand it if the liberties of our country are to be preserved.

A huge tent has been erected which will seat ten thousand persons. The denomination numbers about four millions in this country and

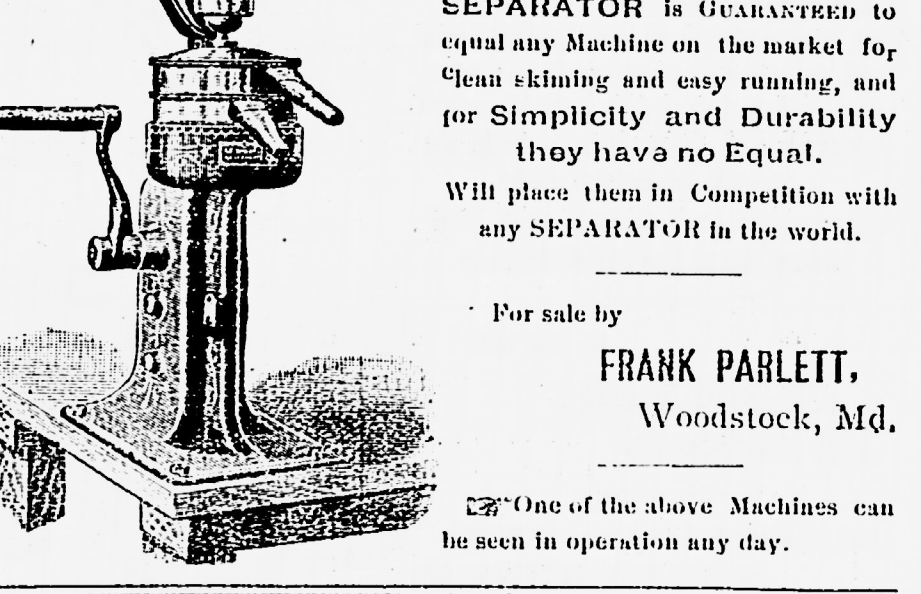
