

A new method of examining the larvnx or trachea directly, without the intervention of a mirror or prism, has been devised by Dr. Kirstein, of Berlin. The patient is placed on his back, with his head hanging down, an aesophagoscope is introduced, and then a tube ten inches long is passed behind the epiglottis and lighted by an electroscope; the larynx can then be seen by the naked eye.
