MR. GORMAN'S TARIFF RECORD.

One of the crying sins committed by Mr. Gorman, according to the Baltimore Sun, was his position on the tariff question. The Philadelphia Record, one of the most pronounced free trade journals of the country in its issue of August 2, discussing "The Maryland Democracy" has this to say which we commend to the profound consideration of all Democrats who prefer to be right on all questions.

"Although the proceedings of the Maryland Democratic State Convention were attended with some friction in regard to the nomination of a gubernatorial candidate, there was no want of harmony in the enunciation of Democratic principles and policy. The resolutions sustain the revenue policy embodied in the new tariff, and emphatically denounce the 'pernicious heresy' of free silver coinage.

"The growth of Senator Gorman in popular estimation throughout the country as well as in Maryland dates from his connection with the present Tariff bill. The Wilson bill as it passed the House, in accordance with the remarkable theory that the Democrats should impose no duties for revenue which the Republicans had removed, would have failed egregiously to meet the wants of the public Treasury. When the bill went to the Senate it was found that there were some crooked sticks in its Democratic membership whose adjustment to any genuine measure of Tariff Reform would be attended with great difficulty.
