WHAT TO DO WITH THE ENDS OF MEAT. Chop raw pieces of meat fine, fry in butter and onions. Make the following omelet: One pint of flour, mixed with a little water or milk; half a teaspoonful of salt, one tablespoonful of lard, one teaspoonful of baking powder; roll half thick, cut square pieces of dough, put meat into each, press the edges together, fry in hot fat, add water, bits of butter; then place in oven. Bake brown.

HOW TO WASH GLASS. Never use soap for glass. Wash all glasses and tumblers in hot water and soda, and rinse in cold water. Soap is necessary for ground glass. You should wash ground glass globes, or any ground glass in a lather of soap and water and soda, with a brush, and then into cold water; dry them immediately out of the cold water; do not let them drain. Ground glass is apt to get a black look from exposure, and therefore all ground glass, such as ice plates, for instance, that are not in daily use, should be wrapped up separately in soft paper, so that it may keep its color.

Wash silk handkerchiefs by laying them on a smooth board and rubbing with the palm of the hand. Use either borax or white castile soap to make the suds; rinse in clear water, shake till nearly dry, fold evenly, lay between boards, put a weight on them. No ironing is required. Silk ribbons may be treated in the same manner.

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A Custom Started in Germany. The custom of celebrating gold and silver weddings belongs to Germany. The silver wedding occurred on the twenty-first anniversary and most people could celebrate that, but to be fifty years married was a sort of event in a family.
