boat' came sailing by and ran on to a sand bar a short distance below. AS VIEWED BY A NOVICE. otball Discussed From the Standpoint

of One Not an Enthusiast. Modern football is in one respect like baseball, in that it affords abundant facilities to kick on the umpire, but otherwise it isn't like anything else on earth. The young men who participate in the game are selected with great care, nobody being cligible who cannot withstand the kick of a mule between the eyes or in the pit of the stomach. Other requirements are a luxuriant growth of hair, any color, and muscular tissue sufficient to meet a freight train on the down grade and knock it off the track. The football is an oyal, leather inclosed chunk of atmosphere, the possession of which seems to be a subject of continual contention.

Two corpulent youths, called the center rushes, take the ball between them, each being in a stooping posture, heads together and legs very wide apart. The teams bunch up in the rear of their respective rushes, one of whom, at a given signal from his captain, snaps the ball back between his legs. A secret code of signals, called off by the captain, conveys the information not only when the ball is to be snapped, but also which player is to take it and attempt to get around or break through the line of the opposition. The trouble begins in the center of the field, between the goals, which are 330 feet apart. The referee sounds his whistle, the captain whose team has the ball calls off his jargon of numbers, and a riot is forthwith inaugurated.

The unfortunate youth who has been selected to carry the ball makes a break at the line of the enemy and is at once pounced upon by the other 21 men and the referce, all of whom fall down on him and kill or cripple him if possible. Then the referee, who is provided with a cane for self defense, pokes around among the wriggling arms and legs, ascertains who has the ball and announces in a fine tenor voice so many yards lost or gained. The fellow who is on the bottom of the pile is brought around with artificial respiration, the teams line up, and the good work goes on. A broken leg or fractured skull entitles a player to withdraw in favor of a substitute. Occasionally a dispute arises over some technical point, whereupon the partisans of the respective sides flock around the disputants and howl for a rope to lynch the referee. It is entirely immaterial which way he decides. There is always throughout the game a manifest disposition to kill him, and every man's hand referee is not a happy one. THE ELECTRIC MAIDEN.

Now Her Trick of Lifting a Heavy Person There are many tricks in the repertory i the so called electric or magnetic girl, all of which seem, at first sight, to involve either the possession of superhuman ettength or else some occult power. As a matter of fact, however, they involve neither. The strangest part of them is that they are all within the ability of any one to perform. Furthermore, it will be found that the very mechanical laws which these tricks appear to set at defiance are the ones upon which they depend for their success, and the chief reason why they have remained mysteries to those who have witnessed them is that they have not tried to repeat them themselves upon the first opportunity afforded.

Let us take the first trick mentionednamely, that of lifting a heavy person in the chair. Tell him to sit down and hold the chair against all your efforts. He will plant his feet firmly on the floor, thus throwing his weight chiefly on his feet instead of on the chair, as he thinks he is doing. If you are in doubt of this, try it yourself, and you will realize that it is a fact. To move the person all that the girl has to do is to get behind and push. In the stooping position which she assumes she will obtain a considerable purchase by bracing her arms on her knees, and will thus have no difficulty in raising the chair slightly. As the sitter assumes a new position, so as to more successfully resist this effort on the part of the girl, she suddenly relaxes her push, directing the chair off to one side or the other. Before the sitter has recovered himself she has raised the chair again, and he is allowed to throw himself again, and so on. The stronger he is and the more he opposes or strives to oppose her the worse ho is off, and the more successful she will be. The trick is more effective if three men try to hold the chair down, because of their divided effort and the tendency, where more than one is opposing her, for them really to oppose each other rather than her. She will be perfectly powerless, however, should even a single person sit listlessly in the chair, with no thought of opposition.—N. W. Perry in Cassler's Origin of the Cue.




