She is easy enough to find, for any guard will direct you t the room where she is at once distinguished by the easels and tourists surrounding her Of course you will seek her with great expectation, for to you she is a youthful ideal about to be realized. You have known of her as long ago as you can remember. Descriptions of the paintings in the Louvre usually begin with the "Mona Lisa." Du Maurier himself has lately made her shine anew in the borrowed light of "Peter Ibbetson," and "those remote acquaintances who have just returned from Europe and know nothing whatever of art invariably gush over this "rare masterpiece of Leon

Your first impressions of the picture will depend upon your own temperament or "way of looking at things." Hence to some it is a disappointment, to others a fascination. Under the shadow of Murillo's huge "Immaculate Conception" it seems much smaller than it really is, and like Leonardo's other great picture, in Milan, the colors are faded and the outlines here and there almost gone. It represents a woman's face and upper figure against a background of rocky landscape. The hair, held in place by a band at the forehead, falls loosely each side of the head. The eyes look sidewise into yours, and the mouth wears a very peculiar expression. Indeed it is this peculiar expression which individualizes the whole countenance and stamps the picture as remarkable.
"What a crafty smile!" exclaimed an

English lady near me. "Exactly as I fancy Becky Sharp's to have been." Thus to the woman of the world the 'Mona Lisa" represents the woman of the world, crafty and designing. To others, the prim picture, the staidly crossed hands, contrasting with the upward lines of the mouth, indicate suppressed mirthfulness, one who enjoys perhaps a subtle joke and to whom life itself is more or less a comedy. To others still those deep eyes and that mysterious mouth attest a profoundly spiritual nature, which can distinguish between realities and illusions and can force a half pitying, half cynical smile for her foolish fellow creatures. Of all the artists who set their easels before this famous lady and give the world unwarrantable copies of her, probably not one pretends to understand her truly. FAMILY LIFE IN BABYLON.

Glimpses of Ancient Customs Given by the Tablets In the British Museum. Glimpses of family life in ancient Babylonia are given by the scriptures from Sennacherib's palace, now in the British museum. From the tablets it appears that the family and the laws concerning it were the foundation of the social system of Babylonian and the social system of the soc ylonia. Take, as an example, the relation of father to son. A son could repudiate his father by the payment of a certain sum of money, but not his mother. In the tablets on family law it is written that a son who wished to deny his mother should have his hair cut off and be banished from \* Members of the Medical Profession | the community. The inwreating to masshould say to her husband, "Thou art not \* nance to the use of nostrums or my husband," which was the Babylonian way of saying that she did not want to live with him any more, then the offending woman was to be thrown into the river. But if the husband wanted a divorce it was a comparatively easy matter for him to obtain it. All he had to do was to return to his wife her dowry, if any, and pay her a certain sum of money. He was then a free man and could marry again if he

felt disposed to do so. The position occupied by women in Babylonia was very different from their position in the cast at the present day. The harem did not exist at all, and the wife was looked upon as the head of the household. A woman could buy or sell property independent of her husband, could enter into agreements or contracts and could possess slaves. In Assyria, which was a colony from Babylonia, the modern harem system was in use, and women, on the whole, occupied a very inferior position.

That slavery existed in Babylonia from the earliest times there is ample proof, but the power and authority of the owner or master were limited. A slave had a definite position and could not only enter into contracts and agreements to his own adyantage, but could even buy and sell as well as possess property and after a certain time could buy his freedom. The slaves from some cause or other seem to have gome upon evil days during the reign of Nebuchadnezzar, for about this time many of their privileges were withdrawn, and the custom of branding each slave with the pame of his master came into use. This custom led to all sorts of disputes, which had to be settled at law, and a large numper of tablets relating to such suits have been found. Education was common throughout Babylonia, and schools of the

glogy and astronomy were founded and at-tyched to every temple of importance.— New York Sun. 
hast undergone, it may be pardoned in a brave man to succumb to sleep. But another time I advise thee to choose thy opportunity more carefully."




