THE ART OF CORRESPONDENCE.

To Write a Charming Letter an Accomplishment-Wax and Scaling. The most delightfully worth while of all necomplishments, writes Mrs. Roger A. Pryor, is, to my mind, that of writing charming letters. However sweet a song may be, it is evanescent as a breath and survives as a divine memory only. Conversation requires the actual presence of those who engage in it, and the pleasure it gives depends upon many things—a melodious voice, an attractive appearance, maybe cheerful rooms, congenial surround ings, freedom from the cares and interruptions of life. But it matters not how cold and bare a garret home may be, nor how forbidding its outleok upon the chimney pots under a wintry sky, or whether the lodge be in a wilderness or foreign land, given some measure of leisure, good stationery and a convenient postoffice, all the world may be ours. We may daily send forth on white wings our highest thought

and most gracious words, and a full meed of appreciation will surely return to us. Such a correspondence may be independent of the formalities of an introduction. No third person is needed if we wish to congratulate an artist or author or express our gratitude to a philanthropist, philosopher or poet. These dwellers in the realms of thought are peculiarly susceptible to this delicate form of flattery. Momentous consequences have occasional ly been the outgrowth of acquaintances thus begun. I knew a happy marriage to result from such a correspondence with a poet, and we all have known friendships, ending only with life, which have been nourished as they were begun by letters

Of course, in the high thinking that must govern correspondence bringing about such results, formulas of expression and matters of stationery are quite swept into the background. And yet, I fancy, the initial letters in most cases must be immaculate-prim, trig little affairs, neat and trim as an epigram, producing some thing like the impression one receives from a perfectly gloved hand extended for its first greeting. The introductory letters must be happily worded—cela va sans dire —but I am sure they should also be neatly written. One should have an alcohol lamp or a roll of the wax tapers sold for the purpose and still air in the room to properly seal letters. With the seal and envelope before you, turn one end of the stick of wax rapidly over the flame, not near enough to ignite it, until it is creamy and ready to drop, then deftly rub it round and round over the point of the envelope flap until enough is deposited, when the dab of wax may be held a moment immediately over the flame. Then firmly press the seal into it. If a drop of the hot wax is first placed under the point of the flap, the scal will be less likely to break. A well cut seal will never stick and practice will insure a firm impression, with the seal. In all this, pray be careful! Blazing wax in some hands is dangerous. Re member Mrs. Longfellow's sad fate from the lace of her gown catching fire as she scaled her letters!—Delineator.

The Free Fights of the Koreans. Remarkable features of the social life of the capital, Cho-sen, are the various guilds and their great stone and stick fights.

Neighboring towns and villages who are jealous of each other, also settle their differences by a stone fight in the first moon, such period being universally set aside for fights, both public and private. Children are encouraged to fight by their parents. who hope to make them hardy and courngeous; sides are made up, and they fight till they are exhausted. The butchers and the mud plasterers had a fierce feud, and it was decided to settle it by a pitched battle on a plain outside the south gate. On the day appointed some 1,800 men went

down to fight, a stream dividing the two camps.

The battle began with volleys of stones as the belligerents neared each other, and when one party forced its way over the stream and all came to close quarters the fighting was carried on with clubs and knives. It was a drawn battle, so the leaders decided, and was renewed a few days later, victory eventually resting with the plasterers. Very few were killed, says Mr. Landor, though none escaped without a wound. But the whole affair sounds like one of Lucian's grotesque battles. The court patronizes these extraordinary duels, and the king is kept informed of the results. The police, of course, take care that the bystanders do not come in for any hard knocks. After the fighting moon has waned life in "the land of the morning calm" sinks back into the usual



Martin said that he met his wife, and as she was then going away to visit her grandmother he kissed her, not thinking it was against any law for a man to kiss his wife. The evidence in the case showed that he did more than kiss his wife, however. Two young men testified that Martin warmly embraced his wife on divers sections of Peters street for a distance of several blocks, and that the performance created disturbance and dis-order in the locality of Peters and Fair streets, so sensational did it become. The couple fairly reveled in the performance of bidding each other a long farewell, the festivities being prolonged for such a length of time that a policeman arrived on the scene and arrested the affectionate husband, complaint having been made to him by W. F. Westley, a storekeeper, and others of the conduct of the man and woman. Officer Phillips said that it had been re-

had been hugging and kissing each other in a store, and that they were made to get out by the proprietor, who said that he want any such conduct at h of business. After hearing the evidence the court said that the disorderly conduct charged had not exactly been established in his mind, the court not being able to see any thing particularly harmful in a man kiss ing his wife on the street or elsewhere, although it might not be exactly "Peachtree etiquette." man kissing and hugging his wife, and he dismissed the case.

Martin and his happy consort left the courtroom beaming with satisfaction. The woman occupied a seat in the rear of the courtroom during the trial and was an interested spectator. When last seen, they were going up Decatur street hand in hand, congratulating each other on having been the means of establishing a principle of law that may be hailed with delight and joy by every affectionately disposed husband and wife. - Atlanta Constitution.

A Brain In Your Throat. Did you know that the throat has a brain of its own? I suppose few people are aware of it, but it's a fact. There is a small ganglion which exercises direct control of the muscles of the throat and acts as its brain. His operations will be resented with violent paroxysms, first of the throat, then of the diaphragm and, if the operator still persists, the patient will be thrown into convulsions Still more curious is the fact that this lit tle brain has a memory, and if once fright ened in this way it is almost impossible to ever gain its confidence, no matter how gentle the operator may be.—Pearson's Weekly.
