



FELL CARESSING HER DEAD BABIES. Pathetic Incident of a Polar Bear Hunt Iu

the Arctic Regions.

"I never look at a polar bear," said an officer from Fort Sheridan who was show-ing a party of friends through the zoo at Lincoln park the other day, "but I think of a pathetic story related to me by a friend in the navy, Lieutenant Bevier. He was a member of an exploring expedition which went into the arctic regions several years ago. Members of the party who were more sportive than scientific in their inclinations spent a good deal of time hunting polar bears. Lieutenant Bevier used to go out with them occasionally, but an experience he had one day ook away all desire for that kind of sport and he never went with them again. "The hunters came upon a bear lying on the ice with two cubs beside her. She was a magnificent specimen, nearly as large, I should judge from his description, as this one in the pit. The cubs were handsome little fellows, and the men were very anxious to capture them. The sailors had a quantity of seahorse flesh in the boat with them, a thing the bears esteem highly. When they had rowed close enough to be able to do so, they flung a big piece of this meat to the cake of ice on which the bears were lying. The old bear looked up as if rather surprised at this unusual generosity and then tore the flesh into three pieces. The two larger ones she gave to her cubs, just as any human moth er would do, keeping only a small piece for herself. The sailors took deliberate aim at her and fired. The idea was to kill her and then carry away the cubs. Owing to the fact that they were bad marksmen. however, or because the boat was unsteady their volley killed the cubs, but only wounded the bear. "Apparently forgetting her own wounds, she began licking those of her babies.

Then she tore off more meat from one of the larger pieces and laid it before them, but when they failed to respond she tried to move them with her paws and raise them up by putting her nose under them. At last she seemed to realize that some thing terrible had happened to them, for she raised her head in the direction of the beat and uttered a loud growl, at the same time making toward it as if she intended to take revenge for the murder of her young. At that instant two of the men fired again, and she fell, but she did not die immediately, and in her last moments licked the body of one of the poor little cubs. Even the sailors were touched by this exhibition of affection, and the lieutenant said he felt as if he had been a party to a crime."-Chicago Tribune.

An Unsuspected Cause of Suffering. A scientist gives an account of a man who was admitted to a hospital with a severe and obstinate case of inflammation of the eyes, face and hands. Ordinary applications gave no relief, and a thorough microscopic examination of the affected parts was resorted to. This proved the existence of thousands of tiny hairs, not unlike in appearance those from the caterpillar. They had entered the skin and produced this violent irritation. The plants which the man had been working with were examined, and it was found that a variety of the primrose was the offender. The downy looking hairs on the leaves were sufficiently rigid to prick through the skin, and each one was charged with a poison after the fashion of the fangs of a snake. The doctor extracted this poison, which he used as a subcutaneous injection in the cases of several patients. He claims excellent results from this method of treating various obstinate skin diseases. In the same connection it may be stated hat experiments in the treatment of can cer have been tried with satisfactory results. An animal was inoculated with cancerous material, then after a suitable period the serum of the blood was collected and two cancer patients were inoculat ed with it. In both cases there was an almost immediate and positive improvement Sufficient time has not elapsed fully to test this discovery, but it certainly has great possibilities, as even though patients are only temporarily benefited there is encouragement enough to persevere until the longed for ultimatum is reached.—New York Ledger.

A Queer Medal of Napoleon III. Napoleon the Great was a sedulous coiner of medals of victory, as all numismatic collectors are aware. His nephew imitated him in this practice, although his opportunities for this kind of self glorification were of course not so numerous as those of his uncle. A collector of Rappoltsweller informs The Tageblatt that he is the possessor of a very rare medal for which Napoleon III ordered a die to be made and of which the specimens would now be extremely plentiful but for the battle of Sedan. On one side of the medal is the profile of Louis Napoleon, whose head is crowned with the laurel of victory and the inscription, "Napoleon III, Imperator." On the other stand the sanguine words "Finis Germania, 1870." The medal is of some white metal, possibly silver, and is somewhat larger than an English half crown. The Tageblatt doubts whether the despondent Napoleon himself gave the order for such a medal to be coined and is rather inclined to think that it is only the speculation of a certain business firm which reckoned confidently upon French conquest of Germany and resolved to get an early profit out of it.-Westminster Ga-

Pipe Smoking as an Art. Americans, as a rule, do not take to pipes as much as Englishmen, for the reason that very few of them know how to smoke. They carry their impulsive, energetic natures into their pipe smoking and puff away as if their existence depended on finishing the pipe in a given time. 1 have seen an American and an Englishman sit down for a quiet smoke and chat, and the American would fill his pipe twice to the Englishman's once. A pipe, to be enjoyed, should be smoked slowly, but the art in smoking so is to keep the pipe lighted. This is a knack which seems to only be well understood on the other side of the pond. The average American pipe smoker uses match after match with every pipeful. People come in to select tobacco, and the one thing they seek for—it is the constant cry—is a "tobacco that will not bite the tongue." There is no tobacco that will come up to this requirement if smoked as pipe smokers usually do. It is not the tobacco, but the heat from the fire in the bowl, that burns the tongue.-Ex-

Is It a Necessity? With each year the practical necessity of a college education for women becomes more apparent, especially for the woman schoolteacher. She who was a graduate always commanded a higher salary than the teacher who had not had such advantages, but now many educational instituions refuse to accept nongraduates as teachers at all. This advance in the educational standard has but one drawback. Like everything else, a good education costs more than a poor one. Hundreds of eager girls obliged to earn their own liveliheod are therefore handicapped in so doing by lack of means to obtain a college education. It is for such as these that the need of free scholarships and any other means that will help them to help themselves is so strongly felt. With the advance in educational standards there should also be an advance in the means by which those standards may be reached .-




