Edward Brown. The following resolutions were unanimously adopted: Whereas, the Hon. Lloyd Lowndes, who has been nominated as the Republican candidate for Governor of Maryland, was once elected to Congress to represent the Sixth Congressional District;

And whereas, he is recorded as having opposed the passage of a Republican measure designed to give the colored race certain civil and political rights justly due, under the law, to every citizen of a free Republic;

And whereas, he is reported to have afterwards said at the Montgomery Hotel, in Rockville, that his reason for voting against said Republican measure was that he thought "the negroes had too many rights already." And whereas, it is now insisted by the

orincipal newspapers supporting Mr. lowndes for Governor that although the nominal candidate of the Repulican party, he is in fact merely the candidate of all independent and non-partisan elements of the faction called Cleveland claimed for it. I believe it to be the Democrats, as opposed to other factions of that party: And whereas, according to the Balti-




