
Leaves' Lungs. One of the prettiest microscopical studies is the examination of the lungs of a plant. Most people do not know that a plant has lungs, but it has, and its lungs are in its leaves. Examined through a high power microscope, every leaf will show thousands upon thousands of openings, infinitely small, of course, but each provided with lips which, in many species, are continually opening and closing. These openings lead to tiny cavities in the body of the leaf, and by the opening and closing of the cavity air is continually passing in and out, so that the act of respiration is constantly going on. The sap of the plant is thus purified, just as the blood of an animal is cleared of impurities by passing through the lungs and an average-sized tree will therefore in the course of a day do as much

breathing as a man.



DANIEL BOONE'S LOG CABIN.

It Is Crumbling Away in Ruins at the "Point" Near Alton, 111. In the panhandle of St. Charles County, Missouri, familiarly known as "the point," directly opposite and a few miles from Alton, Ill., there stand the crumbling ruins of one of the most interesting landmarks in this portion of the Union. It is the log cabin that was for many years the home and abiding place of Daniel Boone, the greatest and most widely known of the original Indian fighters of the land. Late in the eighteenth century a French colony settled at Portage des Sioux, and the quaint little village standing on the west shore of the Mississippi, ten miles above Alton, is still distinguished by the peculiar characteristics of that nationality. In 1795



Colonel Daniel Boone came to Missourl and built his cabin in the Darst bot-

om, a few miles from Portage, and his worth as a pioneer of civilization was recognized by Lieutenant Governor Delassus, who appointed him, on July 11, 1800, commandant of the Femme Osage district. Aside from the settlement of the French at Portage, and the Spaniards in Southern Cal-Ifornia, the cabin of Boone was the first Saxon home founded beyond the oorders of the Mississippi.

The old cabin represented in the accompanying cut therefore antedates the purchase of the Louisiana tract by Thomas Jefferson, and it is cherished by the people of that vicinity beyond price. But of late years the relic seeker has turned his step that way, and the oid landmark is literally being carried away piecemeal. Colonel Boone died at this place in the ninetieth year of his age, in 1822, and was buried hear by, but by an act of the Legislature of Kentucky his remains were subsequently disinterred and laid to their final rest underneath the monument raised by that State to the memory of the brave pioneer. Many of the relatives of the famous old man still inhabit and till the fertile soil of the regions where he chose to make his last home.
