Another Evidence of Prosperliy. "These are significant figures because they show such a marked increase in immigration during the year now passing. and especially so great a gain during the last month of this period. In other words, the increase is even more noticeable now than it was at the beginning of the year, although it was marked even then. The tide of returning prosperity is full upon us, and as that fact becomes more and more certain the influx of

Europeans increases in a steadily greater. iceable all through our history as a nation. In periods of financial discouragement immigration has fallen away, and upon the return of better times it has shown a great expansion. If we had no other measure of our own rising and falling prosperity in the past, we might gauge it with some approach to accuracy by tabulating the nmigration reports.

"At first thought it might be considered strange that the people who emigrate rom Europe to this country are sufficiently well-informed to know when our periods of depression begin and when they end. They are, many or most of them, an gnorant class, not well-posted regarding he affairs of their own country, much less those of any other, and yet they seem to be able to judge when the best time to make the journey across the Atlantic is. It should be remembered however, that in very many instances they have relatives or friends in the United States who keep them well informed about such important matters as this. The American tembers of a foreign-born family have to provide a large portion of the passageoney for their relatives to emigrate with as a rule, and they are not likely o send over the price of a passage when imes are hard. Nor are they liable to advise their friends to cross the ocean when the chances of securing employ when the chances of securing employment here are small. 
