ELECTION REFLECTIONS. One of the results of the late election in this State will be lack of faith in President Cleveland, not in his honesty but in his ability to keep together the party that he depended upon for the maintenance of his well-known principles of tariff reform. If it is really true that on account of prejudice against Mr. Gorman or for any other reason he was willing to let the State go Republican, the jig is up. If it be true that Mr. Cleveland preferred a Republican in the United Senate to seeing Maryland go Democratic, even with Mr. Gorman as the issue, then we would say Mr. Cleveland has concluded to abandon further efforts in the direction of tariff reform, and is preparing to retire from the field of politics and is not studying the possibility of a third term as president.

The general breaking down of the party as exhibited in the late elections is puzzling in the light of the fact that the Democratic tariff bill has had the effect of stimulating the industries of the country has given a million of unemployed men work and has brought peace and thrift where reigned distress and rebellion. 
