



AN EXTRAORDINARY DIVORCE. Both Parties In Interest Swore They Had

"The annals of the divorce courts contain many curious histories," said an old lawyer, "but to me the most remarkable case I ever heard of was tried in Kings county, N. Y., a dozen years ago. Both parties were prominent in society, and for ome time the matter was kept a secret. Mrs. Martin was a young wife and mother of one child when, in 1862, her husband enlisted in the Union army. She heard from him at intervals for more than a year, and then followed a long period of silence. Next she received intelligence of his death. Mrs. Martin donned widow's weeds, and while mourning her husband's death her child died. She then took up her residence with friends, until 1873, when she received the attentions of a Mr. Hyde, a well known business man and a widower with seven children. The courtship extended over a period of 11 months, during which time Mr. Hyde was informed of Mrs. Martin's former marriage, and 11 years after Martin's reported death they were married. Nothing happened to disturb their happiness until about ten years later, when Mr. Hyde informed her that Martin was living in the suburbs of Brooklyn with a wife and children. Investigations proved that the man did live In Brooklyn, as stated, and also that he had left the city in 1862 and entered the

army.
"The case came up before the referce, and there Martin swore that he had never seen Mrs. Hyde; that he was a single man when he joined the army; that he married on his return for the first time and had since been a resident of Brooklyn and made no concealment of his marriage. When Mrs. Hyde was sworn, she called on God in the most solemn manner to witness that she had never seen Mr. Martin, and when the two were confronted with each other neither was in the slightest nanner disconcerted and repeated their former denials of ever having met before. "Former friends and acquaintances of both, however, swore that they had been married and were positive of their identity. After a careful investigation and long consideration the referee decided the preponderance of testimony to be against the defendant and passed an order, which was approved by the Brooklyn city court, annulling the marriage. Mrs. Hyde had no children by her second marriage. Friends volunteered assistance to enable her to carry her case to the superior court, but she concluded to abide by the decision of the referee."-Washington Post.

Oiled Brick and Sandstone. Experiments made to ascertain th length of time that brick and sandston are rendered waterproof or protected by oiling show some valuable results. The oils used were linseed oil, boiled linseed and the crude mineral oil known as "blu oil," and the exposure was on a roof fairly exposed to the sun and weather, the brick being good, sound, machine made. It i stated that the amount of oil and water taken up by the sandstone was very much less than that absorbed by the bricks, although the area of the sandstone cubes was much the greater. Equal amounts of the raw and boiled oils were absorbed. The blue oil, however, was taken up in much greater quantity by both bricks and sandstone, but by the end of 12 months the whole of the 13½ ounces of blue oil had apparently evaporated, and the bricks had returned to their original state, but those treated with raw and boiled oils were unchanged. Finally it was seen that the sandstone cubes treated was seen that the sandstone codes treated with raw and boiled oils returned to their original weights, but not appearing to have lost the good effects of the oils, being practically impervious.-New York Sun.


