BALTIMORE'S NEW MAYOR.

Mr. Alcaeus Hooper, the new Mayor of Baltimore, was inaugurated Wednesday with all the pomp and circumstance incident to such occasions. The novelty of a Republican assuming the mayorallty of Baltimore attracted a large number of persons. Mayor Latrobe, who has hitherto been regarded the "indispensable," city to his successor. In quite an elaborate but indeed in many respects sensible valedictory, he pointed out many of the difficulties that were sure to confront the new incumbent of the office. His address was quite as replete with suggestions as to what ought to be done as Mr. Hooper's was with what he would do.

The ex-Mayor to emphasize or make clearer the difficulties of the position, quoting from ex-Mayor Matthews, of

"Much has been accomplished for the reform of our American cities during the present generation; but the vital difficulty still remains—the difficulty of practicing economy in the face of the fact that a large portion of the people do not want economy, that an other large portion insists upon expenditures as an indirect means of equalizing conditions; and of the fact that those who do not pay directly to the support of the government are in an immense and constantly in creasing majority."

Mayor Hooper in his inaugural evinced a strong desire that the affairs of the city be run on business principles. He said:

"The Mayor of this corporation has duties similar to those of the president of any other corporation, that the members of the City Council bear a relation similar to that of directors in other corporations, and that the citizens are the stockholders. If this conception is a correct one, and I believe it is, then the affairs of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore must be conducted on principles similar to those of any other business corporation."

The ex-Mayor as if anticipating the above lets drop the following rejoinder: "The great difficulty is, to make a city government founded on Democratic selfgoverning principles and universal suffrage, and where at least two thirds of the voters are non-property holders and non-taxpayers, a business and not a political corporation. The city, however, belongs to the people and a majority of its voters through the ballot-box can make its government just what they want it to be.

It is very clear from the above that a political millenium is not going to strike Baltimore city very soon or very sudden notwithstanding the "revolution" that has taken place. It may be demonstrated after all that Mayor Latrobe was as level-headed as any man could be under the circumstances and was contending with difficulties over which he had no control and which are sure to surround Mr. Hooper though his desire for a model administration may be ever iso sincere.

With all that has been said and accomplished Baltimore should be a model city. Should the new administration fail then some theories of popular government so religiously explained and so urgently demanded by the Sun and News

ENCOURAGING OUTLOOK.

From New York Herald. Advance sheets of export statistics furnished our Washington correspondent by the Bureau of Statistics show a most gratifying increase of foreign trade in in American manufactures for Septemer last.

During that month our exports of manufactured articles amounted in value to \$16,351,829, against \$15,329,554 in September, 1894. Prior to the fiscal year ending June 30, 1894, the export-trade in American manufactures had never gone as high as \$167,000,000. In that year it exceeded \$183,000,000, by nearly threequarters a million, and in the fiscal year ending with June last it exceeded that total by more than half a million. But if the rate of export during September last shall be maintained for the present fiscal year the total will be nearly \$200,-

The September exports fail to show the same increase noted in July and August last, but the result is nevertheless encouraging. After last summer's crops were assured the demand for home-made manufactured goods of course increased, and consequently the exports of these goods were slightly diminished. But still the goods shipped abroad in September exceeded in value by over \$1,000,000 the average monthly shipment of any previous year.

A comparison of the September exports of several important classes of our manufactures with the exports of September, 1894, is also peculiarly encouraging. In September, 1894, the exports of American woollens amounted to only \$46,-171, but in September last the amount was \$61,013. During September, 1895, the exports of cotton cloths were \$944,338, against \$830,534 in September 1894. and the exports of other cotton manufactures in the former month were \$143,848 more than in the latter. The exports of leather and manufactures of leather also increased \$570,000 over those of September, 1894. There was slightly increased export of household furniture, lead, steel rails, saws, tools, carriages, street cars, brass, books and other articles. All this indicates progress

Having now free access to the raw wools of the world our woollen and worsted manufacturers are in a fair way to expand their industry and to sell their products in foreign markets. They in it untold millions, as have the English, who annually export \$100,000,000 worth of woollen manufactures and worsted and woollen yarns. In another decade, if not deprived of this vast boon, they will begin to rival England in such

The above facts and figures of the government returns indicate that our manufacturing industries are now generally on a more promising basis than ever before, and that their prosperity is increasing and has come to with the consciousness of intelligent apstay. I feel confident however, that the question will receive attention early in the session. There are much needed changes in the election laws, also, to be made. The present laws are not satisfactory to anyone, and a new act, or a modified form of the old one, will also in all probability be passed at an early date after the Legislature assembles. I think that the school system should be broadened and brought up to a higher standard. I would like to see it removed entirely from the reach of po litical influence, and I believe that free school books should be furnished to ever child in the State. I also believe that the colored schools have been neglected

and I am decidedly in favor of affording the colored people better facilities for the education of their children. "But all these," continued Mr. Lowndes 'are matters which will be considered in detail later on when the subjects are taken up by the Legislature for action. They are all important matters, and no

higher duty can be performed than their atisfactory settlement. Mr. Lowndes was asked about the candidacy of Mr. Wellington for the United States senatorship and said: "I have not seen Mr. Weilington for several days and have had no talk with him concerning the matter. There is no question however that the State law, which pro vides that one of the Senators shall be elected from the Eastern Shore, is unconstitutional. Whether it will be ignored by the Legislature or not is, of course, a matter for that body to decide I have nothing to do with the election of the Senator, and so have no opinion to express as to who will probaby succeed Senator Gibson.

Comparative Value of Foods.

Professor Atwater's exhaustive studies and experiments in this line have led him to the conclusion that the greatest nutritive value in any kind of food of the same specific cost is to be found in cornmeal. He finds that in 10 pounds of the latter there are slightly over 8 pounds of actual nutriment; in 8 1-3 pounds of wheat flour there are over 6% pounds of nutriment in 5 pounds of white sugar there are 41/2 pounds of nutriment, in 5 pounds of beans there are 4 pounds of nutriment, in 20 pounds of potatoes there are 334 pounds of nutriment, in 25 cents' worth of fat salt pork there are 3½ pounds of nutriment, in the same value of wheat bread there are 214 pounds, in the neck of beef 134, in skimmilk cheese the same as the latter, in whole milk cheese a trifle more than 1½ pounds, in smoked ham and leg of mutton about the same, in eggs at 25 Jents a dozen about 7 ounces and in oysters at 35 cents a quart about 3 ounces .-New York Tribune.
