THE PRESIDENT'S FINANCIAL POLICY. The Philadelphia Times commenting

All citizens of every political faith, and every student in our schools, should carefully read and study President Cleveland's plain, straightforward, honest and earnest presentation of the financial condition of the country. He shows how and vote for the man who will stand as and why all our financial troubles came on offset to any further McKinleyism upon us. Unwise as was most of the legislation that produced these multiplied misfortunes, most of it seemed to be a reasonable necessity at the time, and the failure is as much due to changed conditions as to wreng conceptions. We have reached the point when there must be something more than mere patchwork legislation to put this great nation on a broad and enduring financial basis that will command unlimited credit at home and abroad, and upon this Congress will sound monetary system. The madness of the government assuming the position of the supreme banker of the country, and thus making its credit depend upon its ability to give immediate redemption in gold for the various notes issued in its name, is so clearly presented by President Cleveland that only those who will not see the truth, or who lack intelligence to comprehend it, can dispute the resistless logic of his arguments. The facts that we have already redeemed nearly or quite all of our Treasury notes in gold since the resumption of specie payments. and yet have them all on hand for future redemption, and that even one half of our silver certificates have already been redeemed in gold without lessening to the extent of one dollar the obligations of the government to pay out gold prove conclusively that the government must retire its circulation and transfer it to the legitimate banking channels of the country.

The President is entirely sound on the question of providing a long time and lowlinterest bond to meet all future emer gencies of the Treasury and for the retemption of our currency. He wisely purposes that there shall be no diminu ion of our circulating medium. The bonds used for retiring our currency could be made available for banking, and by allowing national banks to issue notes to the full par value of their bonds, and reducing the tax on circulation to the minimum of the cost of furnishing the notes, every encouragement would be given for the extension of our banking system into every section of the country Thus there could be no financial convulsion whatever by the retirement of our government currency on the basis proposed by the President, and if his policy were adopted, the whole question of Wall street financiers gambling in the credit of the government would be settled, and settled forever. Politicians will quibble and cheap money freaks will howl over the President's stern devotion to an honest currency for the maintenance of public and private credit, but ionest and patriotic people of every political faith must heartily commend him for his heroic stand in favor of financial and business prosperity.


