It is more than likely that the late political "revolution" in Maryland will bring prominently to the front the fail as the popular party. temperance question. It is thought that in the next legislature there will be a sufficient number of aident supporters of the cause to demand and obtain from the legislature a law that will meet the views of the State Temperance Alliance without any effort to reach prohibition, except in such localities as wish to do away with the sale of liquor

What is believed will be reached is the. Local Veto Law, the principal provisions of which we publish elswhere in this issue. It is something new to the people of Maryland in that what can be done at all will be accomplished by the signatures of legal voters and taxpayers to a petition for or against the granting of licenses, and, after due form, the majority determines the question of license or no license. The responsibility is thrown entirely upon the people in a quiet and effective way. There will be no hurrah about it, legal voters and taxpayers (women) will be quietly called upon to put their signatures to this cr that petition and they can do so or let the matter go by default as far as they are concerned and there the matter

The new law, however, if it ever becomes such, will develop three classes, those who will not hesitate to sign for license, those who will be eager to sign against license and those who for the Maryland University School of Mediprivate or personal reasons will not sign for either. This latter class will be a weakness to the temperance cause, and we believe in many localities it will give the late Senator Bennett, who won by a the advocates of license preponderance. There are plenty of persons who are willing to give the liquor traffic a stab it they can do it in a quiet way, but cannot be persuaded to come out openly against it. Such being the case the proposed new law will not bring out a full and free expression of public sentiment on the question.

There are so many shades of temperance opinion prevailing among the people that it would be hard to frame a law to suit everybody. Some are in favor of digging up the liquor traffic root and branch as the sum of all evils. Others believe that the saloon as conducted in America has so many forbidding features that it ought to be abolished and the business put into the hands of reputable store-keepers and sold as other goods. Others, (fairly good temperance men) have never surrendered their right to take a drink when they think they need it. Others think it right and proper to use it at their meals, beer and wine for instance, and scout at the possibility of it ever being done away and will go no further than to say that its sale ought to be better regulated. With all this diversity of opinion on the question it will be hard to array the people in a united front for its entire ex-

The evil effects of drink can be seen daily, and woful tales have a thousand audiences and rivers of tears have been shed over the ravages it has caused in the home, but with it all real active temperance sentiment has but slowly developed, because there is a vast difference between the use and misuse of what is generally known as drink. And, beside there is a class of men who will say that while scripture very particularly warns the world against the evil effects of strong drink, scripture does not teach total abstinence, these persons generally citing the instance of Christ turning water into wine at Cana in order to accommodate the guests at wedding feast. All this, however, is answered by the ardent prohibitionist that the scripture also teaches "avoid the very appearance of evil." 
