CHRISTMAS. We inesday next will be ushered in as the eighteen hundred and ninety-fifth anniversary of an event fraught with tremendous posibilities when we contemplate it in the light of the relation man stands to his Creator which relation

Man, especially the converted heathen, stands amazed at the new revelation which has suddenly, as it were, burst upon his mental vision as a flood of light, awakening the brightest anticipations and the holicat aspirations. Accepting the birth of Christ as an historical truth and the resurrection of Christ as a doctrine, with a believing contemplation of the grandest code of ethics ever conceived, the intelligent mind is struck with the harmony of the entire system which has evolved-its adaptation to human wants and its softening and enlightening power as experienced by multitudes of believers and as in-

dicated by history. Let history err or not as to this being the time of year in, or the precise day on which Christ was born, the enlight ened world has accepted it as an histori cal fact and the Christian world as the terrible consequences which follow solution of the question which was ob scured from the beginning and which the world in a state of moral gloom had vainly endeavored to solve in the dim hope that something satisfying would be reached and man would be able to work out a true destiny guided by an infallible system.

When Christ came to the world true religion existed in the dim light of Rabbinical teaching. Beyond and surrounding this was the great pagan and heathen world with all its absurdities upon which man feverishly rested but which taught little else than cruelty and op pression, and in the ages dynasty after dynasty went down strewing the Orient with stupendous monuments of folly and weakness which remain in the valleys and on the plains of Asia Minor and among the sands of Egypt, testifying in unmistakable language of the truth of that religion which Christ came into the world to proclaim.

The perfect blending of "the truth as it is in Jesus" with the truth as given to the world before his coming, stands as marvelous confirmation of all that we are called upon to believe concerning his birth, life, death and mission. He was necessarily a miracle within himself for he was miraculously conceived and the angels of light heralded the joy the world would reap from His presence The strange doctrine of the old testa ment that "there is no remission of sin except by the shedding jof blood"-was to be fully understood through Him.


