Take hold, and show what you can do! RULE FOR WORKING IT .- To the square of the price of one acre before the division, add the square of the difference after the division. Extract the square root of the sum and to that root add the price of one acre before the division. This sum gives the price of two acres, one of the better end and one of the poorer end, after the division. Now you have the sum and difference of two numbers to find the two numbers. To half the sum add the half difference and you have the greater. and from half the sum subtract the half difference and you have the lesser. That is, you have the price per acre of the better end and the price per acre of the poorer end. Then by the principle: "Divide the price of the quantity by the price of v. ity," and you have the quan-
