CUBA'S RESCUE OR WAR. Money will never salve over the sorrow caused by the destruction of the warship, Maine, in the Havana waters. With the loss of this ship and its many victims there is aroused but one sentiment -Spain must withdraw from this side of the Atlantic. For a century our pecille have been shocked by her barbaffty and more than once the dogs had it not been for the kindly disposibeen roused to hot indignation over the wholesale and needless slaughter of people closely allied to us by reason of geographical position and commercial relations. Spain has believed in and exercised but one policy, that of extermination of all who differed in opinion with the powers that be, except when

policy dictated otherwise. slaughter by the Turks, of the murderous practices during the Middle Ages, and of Nero reveling with delight before the agonizing gaze of the myrlads he tortured to death as a public carnival. But what do we see in Cuba under the auspices of Spain? The policy of exterminating the pacificoes of the island was as deliberately set about as was any policy of the Turks or Nero. Is it any wonder that it is difficult to hold back the dogs of war at this stage of the Cuban question. The people of our country have become fired with an impatient zeal for the rescue of Cuba from Spain's relentless clutch.

Spain can never pay us for the loss of the Maine, but we can show her that we utterly scorn her despicable civilization. characterized as it has been with deceit treachery and inhumanity, and that as the only atenement she can make is to withdraw from Cuba and pay the actual value of the vessel destroyed.

This or war is the sentiment of our people. Call this "jingoism" or what you will, it is the jingoism of Patrick Henry when human rights was the issue more than one hundred years ago.
