Hot Cross-Buns.  
In England, especially in London, small spiced and sweetened cakes are sold during Lent. These are known as "hot cross-buns," the best of which are made at Chelsea. Each one is marked with a cross, hence its name. Old-fashioned people used to eat nothing in the latter days of Lent except a cup of coffee and a hot cross-bun each morning; and a certain number of these were always laid away carefully, to be used for various illnesses throughout the year. They were said to bring special blessings. On Good Friday morning this cry may be heard far and wide:

Easter Egg in Asia Minor.  
In Asia Minor a fast is kept through the whole of passion week, terminating Easter morning, when all go to church and listen to a long service. The young men meet outside the church and make a great noise firing off their rifles and pistols. They then make a large bonfire, at which an image representing Judas Iscariot is nailed to a cross and burned. After this they return to their homes and breakfast, the principal dish being red-colored eggs, which they exchange with the words: "Christ is risen."

A Substitute For Easter Eggs.  
In Germany sometimes instead of eggs at Easter an emblematic print is occasionally presented. One of these is preserved in the print room of the British Museum. Three hens are represented as sitting in a basket, in which are placed three eggs ornamented with representations illustrating the Resurrection; over the center egg the "Agnus Dei," with a chalice representing the Holy Spirit. The other eggs bearing the emblem of charity and hope.


### EASTER EGGS IN MANY FORMS.

Dainty and Amusing Toys With Which the Children Celebrate.

Easter has become almost equally with Christmas in many families a day of gladness and gift giving, and while the custom should never be allowed to become a cause of expense ill to be borne, it is quite possible for everybody, high and low, to bring a little good feeling into the household by simple remembrances all around.

Candies are the conceits and none are elaborated. In the simpler forms the eggs are swiftly colored in rainbow hues with aniline dyes, then

insure a firm support. A wonderful cord, tail and wings are of gorgeous feathers glued in place. The feathers are brightened with touches of gold and silver paint. This bird always proves a great success.

Figure 3 shows a mischievous Dame Grundy. The head is an egg shell properly dyed. The body is of English walnut on which the head is made to rest by means of sealing wax or drippings from a wax candle. The arms and skirt are of stiff paper. The little gossiping dame is gowned and capped in tissue paper. She may be made to stand by spreading the stiff underskirt, or she may be suspended by a string running from the body through the head.

A right jolly little fellow can be modeled from figure 4. His body and head are egg shells. These are joined

by slipping the splint with a string into the body shell and extending the cord up through the head. Features are painted in grotesque expression. The hair is of cotton, arms and limbs of pasteboard. The whole is painted a brilliant red with trimmings in gold.

New Use For Stork Milk.  
A creamery in Newark, N. Y., is using stork milk in the manufacture of a product for putting the glazing on fine quality paper. The Newark Herald says: "The Standard Butter Company of Oswego has now commenced the manufacture of their product which is to utilize and create a value for their stork milk and thus allow the payment of better prices for milk. The product is a string to be used by paper manufacturers to put the glazing on fine quality papers. Heretofore a fine quality of glue with other compounds has been used, but it was recently discovered that a much better and cheaper string could be made from stork-milk. The Standard Company has now made a five-year contract to furnish this to some large paper manufacturers. At the creamery in this village, in charge of N. Hager, the new product is now being made. The stork-milk is put in a vat, treated with chemicals and heated until curd is formed, then the curd is washed and pressed and shipped to the headquarters at Oswego. There the curd is ground fine and put in a large and improved drying kiln, where it is dried in about twelve hours, then bagged, and is ready for shipment."
