WAR DECLARED,

The two houses of Congress Monday night pulsated with great seriousness and under a keen sense of responsibility but not without full determination to bring to a close the differences they held as to the construction of a resolution defining the exact attitude this country should assume bearing on the Cuban question. The House resolution went no farther than intervention, the Senate wanted recognition. It was after midnight before a concurrent resolution was reached. The resolution not only frees Cuba but guarantees the Island independence. The situation has now assumed its gravest aspect. War seems inevitable. Doubtless the government of Spain would gladly accede to the demands of this government, but the people are possessed with the insane idea that Spain is all powerful and should go to war.

The tocsin of war is no sooner sounded than the thrilling cry of "Remember the Maine" is heard. And this is not all. It will be practically the penalty inflicted by civilization on Spain for the wretched colonial policy which incites men to die rather than live under her rule.
