at any time. As a result, the first loss of life on the American side since the war began occurred on the little torpedo boat, but the Spaniards paid dearly for it. A solid shot struck the hull of the Winslow and tore out her boiler. Five men were killed and five wounded. Ensign Worth Bagley is among the killed.

DEWEY'S GREAT FIGHT.

THE VICTORY EVEN MORE COMPLETE THAN FIRST REPORTED. Not One Man Killed on the American Side

Enemy's Fleet. Commodore Dewey's victory in Manila Bay has been on everybody's tongue. While the Spaniards had an armament quite equal to our own when we consider that they had more ships engaged and aided by land batteries, they failed in their; gunnery, and in this respect Commodore Dewey possessed a decided advantage and it told with fearful effect. An Associated Press dispatch dated Hong Kong, May 8, graphically describes the fight as follows:

Among naval men, military men and civilians, Europeans and natives here today, there is only one subject of discussion, the brilliant, dashing, annihilating victory of the American fleet under Commodore Dewey over the Spanish fleet commanded by Admiral Montejo in Manila Bay on Sunday last.

STOPPED FOR BREAKFAST.

A shell from the Spanish flagship cut he halvards from the hand of Lieutenant Brumley, on the Olympia. It was immediately after this fusillade that Commodore Dewey caused the withdrawal of his ships in order that the men

might cat breakfast. "We'll take a cup of coffee," said the man of the hour, as he stepped from the bridge, "and then we'll finish them."

This grand achievment is quite as much due to the generalship of Commodore Dewey as to the fact that the American gunners, ships and guns are superior to any thing in the same line afloat anvwhere. Credit must also be given to the fullest extent to the officers under Commodore Dewey, for, to a man, they seconded their gallant commander in every way possible and thus helped him earn the laurels which are so justly his.

Commodore Dewey arrived at Subig Bay, about 80 miles north of Manila Bay, on Saturday, April 30, and sent the Baltimore and Concord to reconnoitre the enemy Yet Carnage Prevailed on the Spanish | They found no Spanish ships at the en-Decks-Absolutely Nothing Left of the trance of the bay, and so the Commo dore decided to risk the mines and proceed that same night after dark into the

Bay of Manila, which he did. The order of battle taken up by th Spaniards was with all the small craft inside the stone and timber breakwaters of Cavite harbor. The larger ships of Spain cruised off Cavite and Manila. FIRST OF THE FIGHT.

The American fleet entered Manila Bay on Saturday night with the greatest case. The Spaniards had not established a patrol, and there were no searchlights at the entrance of the bay. In fact, the American ships would probably have passed inside the bay without any challenge had it not been that some sparks flew up from the McCulloch's funnel Thereupon a few shots were exchanged with the batteries on Corregidor Island but the fleet did not slow down, and soon took up a position near Cavite, awaiting dawn in order to commence hostilities.

The early hours of the morning revealed the opposing ships to each other, and the Spanish flagship opened fire. Her action was followed by some of the larger Spanish warships, and then the Cavite forts opened up and the smaller Spanish vessels brought their guns into The American squadron, which had

been led into the bay and through the channel by the flagship Olympia, did not reply, though the shells of the Spaulards began to strike the water around them, but moved majestically onward. When nearing Baker Bay a sudden upheaval of water a short distance ahead o the Olympia showed that the Spaniards had exploded a mine or a torpedo. This was followed by a second and similar explosion. They were both utterly unsuccessful. The American fleet was then drawing nearer and nearer to the Spaniards, whose gunnery was very poor, the shots from the Cavite bat teries and from the Spanish ships being equally badly aimed, and either falling short or going wide of the mark.

THE LINE OF BATTLE. When the American fleet entered the bay, coming through the southern channel, between Caballo and Frile Islets, the following was their order:

The flagship Olympia, Baltimore, Raleigh, Concord, Boston, Petrel, McCulloch with the two storeships, the Nanshan and Zafiro bringing up the rear. Though the Spaniards had opened fire

at 6,000 yards, the Americans reserved their fire until within 4,000 yards of the The Reina Christina, Castilla, Don Antonio de Ulloa, Isla de Cuba, Isla de Luzon and the Mindanao were in line of side the harbor.

The American ships then passed backward and forward six times across the Every American shot seemed to tell, while almost every Spanish shot missed the mark.

After having thus scattered death and demoralization among the Spanish fleet and in the Spanish batteries, the American fleet retired for breakfast, and, incidentally, a council of war was held on board the Olympia. SPANISH FLEET DEMORALIZED.

By this time the Spanish ships were in desperate condition. The flagship Reina Christina was riddled with shot and shell, one of her steampipes had burst and she was believed to be on fire. The Castilla was certainly on fire, and, soon afterward, their condition became worse and worse, until they were eventually burned to the water's edge.

The Don Antonio de Ulloa made a most nagnificent show of desperate bravery. When her commander found she was so torn by the American shells that he could not keep her afloat, he natled her colors to the mast and she cank with all hands fighting to the last. Her hull was completely riddled, and her upper deck had been swept clean by the awful fire of the American guns, but the Spaniards, though their vessel was sinking beneath them, continued working the guns on her lower deck until she sank beneath the waters.

During the engagement a Spanish tor pedo-boat crept along the shore and round the offing in an attempt to attack the American storeship, but she was promptly discovered, was driven ashore and was actually shot to pieces.

The Mindanao had in the meanwhile een run ashore to save her from sinking, and the Spanish small craft had sought shelter behind the breakwater from the steel storm.

THE SECOND FIGHT. The battle, which was started at about 5.30 A. M., and adjourned at 8.30 A. M. was resumed about noon, when Commo dore Dewey started in to put the finish ing touches of his glorious work. There was not much fight left in the Spaniard by that time, and at 2 P. M. the Petrel and Concord had shot the Cavite batteries into silence, leaving them heaps of ruins and floating the whi e flag. The Spanish gunboats were then scut tled, the arsenal was on fire and the explosion of a Spanish magazine caused

further mortality among the defenders of Spain on shore. On the water, the burning, sunken or destroyed Spanish vessels could be seen, while only the cruiser Baltimore had suffered in any way from the fire of the enemy. A shot which struck her exloded some ammunition near one of her guns and slightly injured half a dozen of

the crew. Several shots passed dangerously closo Commodore Dewey, but little or no

Admiral Montejo, the Spanish commander, transferred his flag to the Isla de Cuba when his ship caught fire, but the latter was destroyed also in due course of time. The Reina Christina lost her captain, a lieutenant, her chap-

lain and a midshipman by one shot, which struck her bridge. About 100 men were killed and 60 wounded on board the Castilla. Indeed, come estimates place the number of Spanish wounded during the engagement at over 1,000 mem. The Olympia was struck five times about her upper works, and a whaleboat of the Raleigh

was smashed. Although the Krupp guns on the Esplanade of Manila were fired continuously during the engagement, Commodore Dewey did not reply to them, and the battery afterward hoisted a white flag in token of surrender.

The terms of the capitulation were still unsettled when the McCulloch left Manila, and it was said Commodore Dewey feared rioting upon the part of the insurgents if he attempted a bombardment of the remaining fortifications at Manila. The forts at the entrance of the bay were dismantled on Wednesday after they had capitulated.
