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THE WAR

Since our last issue nothing of a decisive character has happened. There was a vigorous bombardment by Admiral Sampson's fleet of San Juan, on the island of Porto Rico, but no landing was effected.

The purpose of the attack seemed to be to test the strength of the fortifications. It certainly afforded a good deal of gun practice for our gunners.

The guns of several of the fortifications were silenced and it is thought demolition of the same was accomplished.

After a thrilling experience several of our ships succeeded in cutting two of the cables which run out of Cienfuegos, on the south coast of Cuba.

The Spanish fleet in the West Indies has not yet been defeated though it is believed that Sampson is within a day's sail of the Spaniards and a battle has been expected hourly.

An important turn of affairs at Cuba cannot be much longer delayed. Losada, Inspector-General of the Spanish forces in Cuba, recently issued his official report showing that he had the rebellion in Cuba since January, 1895, a failure unprecedented by that recorded in the history of any former campaign in modern times.

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William Ewart Gladstone, England's oldest and most revered statesman, died Wednesday morning, in the 90th year of his age.

Requirements of Those Who Enter the Regular Army. The instructions issued by the War Department to govern recruiting in the regular army in time of war give the weight required for men enlisting for various branches of the service.

For the infantry and the artillery branch the height must be not less than five feet four inches and weight not less than 120 pounds and not more than 160 pounds.

Memorable Ceremony Recalled. It will be 70 years on the 4th of July, 1898, since the corner-stone of the present Baltimore and Ohio railroad was laid in Baltimore by Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, who, as is well known, was the signer of the Declaration of Independence.

This fact was brought to mind last week by the removal from the Baltimore and Ohio treasury's vault to the Masonic Temple in Baltimore of the Masonic emblem and tools which were used by General Carroll during the ceremonies of laying the corner-stone.
