HIS VOTE BEAT HIM. How the Invention of Telegraphy Led to

a Congressman's Defeat. Dr. Gatling, the gun man, is a relative of General Lew Wallace and tells the following story about the latter's father: "David Wallace was a member of congress from an Indiana district when S. F. B. Morse asked the government to give him \$10,000 for the purpose of building the first telegraph line from Baltimore to Washington. Wallace was a member of the committee to which the bill providing for the appropriation was referred, and it happened when the matter came up for consideration that he was absent. The vote in committee was a tie, and so Wallace was sent for. He voted to give the in-

ventor the \$40,000, and accordingly the bill went through. "This happened along toward the end of Wallace's term, and when he went home to strive for re-election he found that the news concerning his action on the Morso telegraph appropriation bill had preceded him. A man named William Brown, who afterward became prominent in congress, had been nominated by the Democrats and he was conducting a vigorous cam

paign.
"In those days joint stumping tours were customary, and the two candidates went from place to place through the district, asking for the votes of the people. Brown's platform consisted of only one plank. That was the criminal record of

his opponent. "He would get up before a crowd of voters and ask them if they had heard how Wallace had voted to give \$10,000 of the public's money to a man who proposed to transmit messages by means of a wire between Baltimore and Washington. The ridiculousness of such a thing was so apparent that Wallace's action could not be considered as a mere mistake. It was clearly an outrage upon the people-a deliberate swindle.

" 'You may not believe,' Brown was in the habit of concluding, 'that any man with a spark of common sense would vote away the public funds for the furtherance of such a chimerical scheme, but the gentleman is here before you. Ask him if I have told the truth or not, and let him explain his action if he can.

"Wallace of course admitted that he had voted away the money, and he tried to explain what Morse proposed to do, but it was all in vain. His constituents made up their minds that he was either a fool or something worse, and he was therefore snowed under at the polls. "It is gratifying to know that Wallace lived to see the telegraph established as an important factor in civilization, but I suppose there are people in that district who still think he was a fool and that he deserved defeat."-Cleveland Leader.

ALDERSHOT.

The Grounds Where the British Soldie Is Drilled In Maneuvers. Aldershot is a tract of land four or five miles square situated about 35 miles southwest from London. The soil is a yellowish clayey gravel, admitting of no cultivation. The country is slightly rolling. Several railroads and a canal traverse the tract. A range of hills, offering a good defensive position, passes through it. army post containing barracks and quarters for several regiments of regular troops, with storehouses and magazines for supplies. During the active season in spring and summer the garrison is in-creased by other regiments of regulars, and by a large body of volunteers, so that there are usually from 10,000 to 15,000 men in the camp, most of them in tents. These volunteer regiments are from time to time relieved to be replaced by others. The entire force present is under the command of an officer of high rank (usually a lieutenant general) of the regular army. The troops are kept hard at work. Besides the usual drills, parades, reviews and s on there are almost daily maneuvers on a large scale of infantry, cavalry or artillery or all three arms combined, illustrating marches in advance or in retreat in the presence of an imaginary or a represented onemy, dispositions for attack, combats, etc. The conclusion of each maneuver is followed by a criticism made by the general commanding, in which he endeavors to point out the merits or the defects in the manner in which the maneuver was conducted .- Captain James Parker, U. S. A., in Harper's Magazine.




