THE WAR.

The war events of the week have awakened the liveliest anticipations as to what is to follow. Our fleets on the south coast of Cuba have successfully silenced | way grab, needs washing. the guns at Santiago, Carmanera, Aquadores and Darquiri. Troops and siege guns have been landed with the view of investing Santiago, which must inevitably fall. Lieutenaut Hobson with eight men has performed the perilous feat of sinking the collier, Merrimac, in the narrow channel leading into Santiago harbor amidst a shower of shot and shell, escaping harm except the slight wounding of two of his men. A junction has been made with the insurgents about Santiago and the place is now thoroughly isolated.

It is believed that Porto Rico will next be attacked and the resistance there is not expected to be very great as a majority of the people are believed to be in sympathy with our cause.

In the meantime the Spaniards at Manila have been badly beaten by the insurgents under the leadership of Gen. Aguinaldo. The enemy has lost 2000 men, taken prisoners, and and a large number have been killed. Admiral Dewey is only awaiting the arrival of reinforcements when Manila will be speedly occupied and protection afforded all non-combatants under the American

The authorities in Spain have already weakened and were it not for the people peace would be sought on most any terms to save what is left of the country.

The south is getting its full share of naval heroes. Blakely, the hero of the Winslow affair, was, a southern boy and Lieut. Hobson, whose exploit-the sinking of the collier Merrimac in the mouth of Santiago harbor-has never been surpassed for cool-headed daring and bravery, is another. Four of the six men who accompanied Hobson are from Massachusetts, one from New York, and one from Iowa.


