THE WAR.

The war situation has practically unchanged since our last issue, except that Gen. Shafter has made decided advances toward Santiago.

A severe fight has occurred between Roosevelt's rough riders and the Spaniards about midway between the landing and Santiago. Our men were attacked by a large detachment of the enemy on ground of their own choosing and though possessing all the advantage were driven back and the field occupied by our troops.

We lost about a dozen of men killed and about fifty wounded. The Spanish loss was much more severe. Gen. Shafter is rapidly increasing the city notwithstanding that the city is being planted by the destruction of the enemy's works.

When the final assault comes, though the loss may be severe, the city is doomed. Additional troops are being forwarded to the scene of action.

A fleet ere long will start for the Spanish coast, probably taking in the Canary Islands first.

Our transports have not yet arrived at Manila, but Admiral Dewey telegraphs that he has complete command of the situation, with large numbers of insurgents closely investigating the city.

Germany has five ironclads in the harbor and her suspicious action has awakened some concern in this country. Cuba and Porto Rico once taken Germany would have reason to repent any rash action on her part.

WHERE THE WAR TAXES FALL.

An Epitome of the Revenue Act.

"J. M. C." the well known Washington correspondent of the Philadelphia, Pa., Ledger, sends the following epitome of the Revenue Act.

The Revenue bill, which became a law on July 1st, and now in operation, is a much more comprehensive and reaches a larger number of persons than any other law in perhaps generally understood.

Permitted liquors, \$2 per barrel, with a discount of 75 cent on all sales of stamps to brewers. The quantity of liquor stored in warehouses, to which stamps have been affixed, is to be assessed and collected as now provided by law.

SPECIAL TAXES.

The following special taxes are to be paid after July 1st: Bankers employing a capital of \$25,000 or less, \$50; for every additional \$10,000 in excess of \$25,000, \$2.

Chewing gum and substitutes, for each package, not more than \$1 of retail value, 4 cents; exceeding \$1 of retail value, for each additional dollar or fractional part, 4 cents.

Spitting tobacco, for each pint, 2 cents. Sugar and petroleum refiners pay a tax on each barrel, containing more than one gallon, on gross receipts in excess of \$250,000.

Palace and Sleeping Cars—After July 1st on each ticket issued for a seat in a palace car and on each ticket issued for a seat in a sleeping car, a stamp must be affixed by the company selling the same.

Where the whole amount of such personal property shall not exceed in actual value the sum of \$100,000, passing through any one person either by will or the intestate laws of any State, or any personal property transferred by death, grant, etc., is subjected to the following tax, where the whole amount does not exceed \$10,000 and not exceed \$25,000.

First. When the person entitled to beneficial interest shall be the husband or wife of the person who died possessed at the rate of 75 cents for each \$100 of clear value of such interest.

Second. Where the beneficiary shall be the descendant of a brother or sister of the person who died possessed, at the rate of \$1.50 for each and every \$100 of the clear value of such interest.

Third. Where the beneficiary shall be the brother or sister of the father or mother, or a descendant of a brother or sister of the father or mother, of the person who died possessed, at the rate of \$1.50 for each and every \$100 of the clear value of such interest.

Fourth. Where the beneficiary shall be the brother or sister of the grandfather or grandmother, or a descendant of the brother or sister of the grandfather or grandmother of the person who died possessed, at the rate of \$4 for each and every \$100 of the clear value of such interest.

Fifth. Where the beneficiary shall be in any other degree of collateral consanguinity than is hereinbefore stated, or shall be a stranger in blood to the person who died possessed, shall be body politic or corporate, at the rate of \$5 for each and every \$100 of the clear value of such interest.

Legacies or property passing by will to the husband or wife of a decedent are exempt.

Where the amount of value of property shall exceed \$25,000, but shall not exceed \$100,000, the rates of tax above set forth shall be multiplied by one and one-half exceeding \$100,000, but not exceeding \$500,000, the rates of duty shall be multiplied by two; exceeding \$500,000, but not exceeding \$1,000,000, the rates of duty shall be multiplied by two and one-half; exceeding \$1,000,000, the rates shall be multiplied by three.

Dealers in mixed flour are to pay a special tax of 1 cent on each barrel of 48 pounds of mixed flour a tax of 4 cents is imposed, and in that proportion for packages containing a larger or smaller quantity. The tax to be paid by coupon stamps, which must be affixed by the parties making or packing the flour.

Upon ten of all kinds there is to be a duty of 10 cents per pound.
