Kent Farms.

The last cannery in Kent was closed a few days ago, and in spite of the fact that but with two notable exceptions the fruit crop was almost a total failure. many Kent county fruit-growers have handsome results on the credit side of the ledger. The Keiffer pear and the tomato have been the financial solution of many farmers this season, although both crops were below the average. One canner paid this season for pears alone about \$8,000. His daily pay roll for labor was about \$125 for eleven weeks, or sixty-six days. This gives a total to pear-growers in the vicinity of his canneries and for labor of \$16,250. > Grover Cleveland as Viewed by Watterson Col Henry G. Watterson on the oc casion of the thirtieth anniversary of his paper, the Courier Journal, Nov. 8 1898, in his picturesque way gives us much political and journalistic history that is interesting. Among his biographical sketches we find the tollowing concerning Grover Cleveland:

"Mr. Cleveland became on the 4th of March, 1885, the first Democratic President in a quarter of a century. A strong self-confident, but uninstructed man, he proved a very bull in a china shop. Of the tariff he knew nothing, and almost next to nothing of the men who had fought the battle for revenue reform. He did not temporize. He simply floundered. The only question he seemed to care about was civil service reform. seen a light, he sent a message to Congress, of which, though it electrified the country, he did not remotely forsee the consequences, or in the least comprehend the force. 
