SCHLEY AND SAMPSON Rear Admiral Sampson will hereafter MOTICE. salute the flag of Rear Admiral Schley. By the passage of the new navy bill and and Sampson, with Schley as the ranking officer, Schley stands No. 9 in a list of 18 rear admirals with Sampson as No. 11 on the list, two grades below Schley. If Schley and Sampson had been confirmed as their names originally were sent to the Senate along with the others who participated in the battle of Santithe temptation to speak ill of others, and ago, Sampson would have stood No. 4 on 5, being the junior of Sampson.

Under the new navy bill there are 18 rear admirals and the rank of commodore is abolished. The rear admirals are in two classes; the first half holding a rank against or for them; and this often in the army, and the last half holding a rank corresponding with the brigadier general. Thus Schley not only ranks Sampson in numbers, but he is one of the first class rear admirals who rank as major general in the army, while Sampson is a second class rear admiral ranking as brigadier. The pay of the first class rear admirals,

of which Schley is one, is \$7,500 a year; and the second class rear admirals, which includes Sampson, are paid \$5,500 a year. The pay of a rear admiral was formerly \$6,000 when on sea duty and \$4,000 when awaiting orders, but the new law provides that the first class rear admirals shall receive the pay of major generals of the army and the last 9 rear admirals the pay of brigadier generals. As generals in the army are paid the same salary whether on duty or unas-

The one significant feature of this acion by the President and Congress, that commanded the unanimous vote of the Senate, is the distinct and emphatic reproof that is given to the pretensions of Rear Admiral Sampson. He is not only made the subordinate of Rear Admiral Schley whom he sought to destroy but his reduced rank clearly emphasizes the expression of the government and of the nation against his assumption that he is the conqueror of Cervera's fleet .- Phila.
