## THE ASSESSMENT LAW.

ONE OF THE ALLEGED PROMISES OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY.

What it Cost and How it Has Increased Taxation-Its Inequalities and Exempttions of Wealth.

One of its promises was a new assessment, and a law authorizing one was passed at the session of the General Aspectation of passed at the session of the General Assembly in 1896. The demand for a new assessment law arose from the exemptions of wealth and inequalities in assessment. The people wanted all classes of property to be taxed alike at a uniform rate. They wanted all to contribute to the public expense according to their actual worth in real and personal property, as the organic law provides. They believed that an assessment law that would bring all classes of property upon the assessment books and tax all alike, tax rates could be se reduced that the burden of government would be so light as not to embarrass any.

To formulate an entirely fair and equitable assessment law was a matter beset with difficulties. The law which was passed by the Legislature in 1896 did not meet the public demand, and the supplemental bills, demanded by Gov. Lowndes at the command of corporate influences as | 157.71. Farms are taxed whether they yield a revenue or not, and so are tenantless houses, stores and offices. Farming lands and town and city property is assessed at their cash value, and the assessors adhered pretty closely to the valuation of 1876, when there had been a great depreciation by 1896. It is said instructions were given to assessors to keep up the basis, as a considerable reduction and a consequent increase of the tax rate would seriously react upon the Republican party. While bonds, certificates of indebtedness and evidences of debt pay but 30 cents on the \$100 of their market value, real property is taxed at \$2.00 in Baltimore city and from 45 cents in Carroll, which has the lowest county tax rate, to \$1.12; in Somerset, which has the

rate of \$1.00 or more. Mortgages are a favorite security in this State, and many millions of dollars are invested in them. One of the demands of the people was that mortgages should be taxed. The Republican legislature of 1896 inserted a provision for taxing them in the assessment law, sec tion 146 A.

Money invested in mortgages is mostly surplus money-money not needed in actual business or in running a farm. It is essentially wealth, and yet the legislature was very considerate in taxing wealth invested in mortgages. Holders are required to pay eight per cent. of the gross Income, two per cent. going to the State and six per cent. for county purposes where the holders reside. A \$1,000 mortgage, bearing six per cent., would yield \$4.80-\$1.20 going to the State, and \$3.60

to the county where the holder resides. This mortgage tax is another discrimination in favor of wealth as patent as in

the discrimination in favor of bonds. The income from a \$10,000 mortgage would yield a tax of \$48 in Baltimore or in any county in the State. The tax on a \$10,000 house in Baltimore would be \$200 for city purposes, and for state purposes, \$17.75, or a total of \$217,75. This is a discrimination in favor of the holder of the mortgage of \$169.75 in taxes.

When there is no income from a mort-

gage no taxes are paid, but taxes have to be paid upon the more than 7,000 tenantless buildings in Baltimore. And the same is true of tenantless houses, stores, and offices in the towns and other cities

of the State. A \$1,000 mortgage will pay a tax, provided there is a six-per cent. income, of \$4.80. A \$1,000 farm pays a county and State tax in Carroll of \$6.271, and a much higher rate in every other county, reaching the highest point in Somerset, where the tax is \$11.25.

Not only is the law discriminating in ts provisions in favor of wealth, but it is full of ambiguities and is differently construed throughout the State. The Democrats of the Senate, particularly, made a strong effort to have a fair and equitable law, but they were outvoted and had to sanction the act and the supplementary bills or be placed in the attitude of having accomplished the defeat of an assessment law.

The law is a failure entirely in meeting public expectation. The assessors seem to have nursed their jobs, as the assessment cost fully sixty per cent. more than DEMOCRATIC TICKET. the assessment of 4876. 
