For this act he claims great credit, but he never knew, perhaps, that the Democrats kept Prof. Newell, a Republican, in the same position for about twenty years. The fact was not heralded abroad, for the Democrats did not use the public school system for political ends, like Gov. Lowndes and the Republican party is doing.

Gov. Lowndes has lately said much in the public press about believing in lifting the judiciary about partisan politics. Since he became Governor three vacancies have occurred on the bench by reason of the deaths of three Democrats. In two instances he appointed straight and pronounced Republicans, Judges Russum and Schmucker. Judge Russum had been one of the most active Republicans on the | running sores. It stimulates liver, kid-Eastern Shore, and immediately resumed his partisan activity when he retired from the bench. In the third instance Gov. Loundes gave a Republican the refusal of an appointment. It was not his fault that a Republican did not succeed Judge Roberts. And when he did fill the vacancy he selected a gentleman who had materlally aided the Republican party lately.

Gov. Lowndes, when a candidate for Governor in 1895, talked nicely of civilservice reform. He has given evidence of how much he believed in it by Republicanizing the county school boards, who in turn replaced experienced and efficient school examiners with inexperienced

He said that public office was a public trust, to be administered for the good of the public interests, not made the rewards for partisan activity. He was scarcely warm in the Executive Mansion before he began dealing out offices to make Wellington Senator and enable Mudd to get a nomination for Congress.

In no instance can it be shown that the Governor's practice has harmonized with ms public utterance. It is inconceivable how he can have the effrontery, with his record altogether to the contrary, to go Beaumont, Texas. When he is framing his political contracts at the Maryland Club, he is an ardent reformer, but when he is dining and wining at Republican leagues and banquets he is as bitter an enemy of the Democratic party as the extremist fanatic from the shores of New England. When he leaves his home amid the celestial regions of Allegany county and ands in Baltimore city, he envelops himseif in his dazzling domino of reform, so that he can flirt gracefully with the in-
