THE FOLLY QUARTER MEETING

THE FARMERS TOGETHER EN MASSE IN THE INTEREST OF DEMOCRACY TO HOLD FOR THE STATE.

One of the Most Representative Gatherings ever held in the County—Gov. John Lee Carroll, President—On the Democracy in Evidence—Great Day of Speech-Making—Not a Word of Discard.

All roads seemed to converge toward the Folly Quarter Saturday night, the people venturing their way there, attracted by the announcement that several of the most distinguished speakers of the State would discuss questions affecting our commonwealth, from a Democratic standpoint.

The day in point of weather was all that could be desired, and those who wanted an outing, besides attending their adherence to the principles of the "party of the people," were fully gratified, having seen and heard much calculated to fasten conviction.

The procession, which had formed at the intersection of the main road with the Clarkeville turnpike, assumed quite large proportions by the time it reached the Folly Quarter. The stage carriage Cornet Band furnished most excellent music, and the day throughout was one of animation, cordiality and confidence.

Addresses were made by Col. John Walter Smith, Dr. Joshua W. Heering, Isaac Lobe Struss, W. Miles, John Lee Carroll, Joshua N. Warfield, Thos. B. Wheeler and Wm. B. Peter.

It had been expected that Senator Arthur P. Gorman would be present. A telegram received by Mr. Joshua N. Warfield early in the morning, however, advised that he had been unable to attend for some time, and the darkness clouds of the morning had forced him to banish the idea of addressing the Howard Democrats with the exception of the Cornet Band.

If the meeting did not prove quite an all-day affair, it was probably the most compact half-day affair of the kind ever held in Howard county. Nearly the entire afternoon was spent in listening to the ablest speeches probably ever delivered in Howard county. Col. John Walter Smith presided in good trim. His voice remained unimpaired, the last sentences of his rigid array of Republican government were as clearly and as loudly pronounced as his first ones.

There were 1,000 or more voters present. They came to the mansion in conveyances of all sorts and many drove long distances to be present. At noon a lunch was served to all present, after the picnic fashion, while the speakers and the score or more of the present company dined in the upper rooms of the mansion. A toastsome meal was served in a most informal manner.

After this the speech-making took place. Joshua Warfield called the meeting to order and went through the formality of introducing the speakers, and the order of the program. The following vice-presidents were named: John Kynce, Conrad Zink, Thomas H. Hunt, W. P. Fulton, Beaufrey, John Wells, Thaddeus Crapster, Lenox Martin, George W. Carr, George Henn, James L. Hobbs, L. Gov. Carroll advanced to the stand to the accompaniment of much applause, and said, in part: "It is with pleasure inexpressible that I today introduce to you, the friends and neighbors of my entire life, the nominees of the Democratic party. It was with pleasure that I assured them of the hearty support of this county, and it is with genuine delight that I will listen to them today."

Colonel Smith's speech in a characteristic manner and confined his remarks principally to the general issues of the campaign. In part, he spoke as follows: "The Republicans say that they should be given another term because of their conduct of public office during the past four years. I have no quarrel with Governor Lowndes, but I must challenge this statement. In what have they shown themselves superior to the Democracy? Have peace and good order been better preserved during their administration; have better officials been appointed; have they connected themselves with the party of the people, and have better and wiser laws been enacted? Alonzo L. Miles then took the platform and discussed in an able manner Governor Lowndes' record. He showed the Democratic party's record in a most unflattering light, and his statements were warmly received. Isaac Lobe Struss followed Mr. Miles.
