THE ASSOCIATE JUDGESHIP.

There is much speculation and discussion in Carroll county over the probable successor to Judge Jones as associate judge of the Fifth circuit. During the campaign the judgeship fight overshadowed every other issue in Carroll county and very little else was talked about. There has been no abatement of the discussion since the election. The Republicans condemn the course of Governor Lowndes in declining to fill the vacancy, leaving the appointment to Gov.-elect Smith. Among those mentioned on the Democratic side are ex-State's Attorney David N. Henning and Charles E. Fink, and William H. Thomas, the son-in-law of the late Judge Roberts Two names are mentioned among the Republicans, that of Charles T. Reifsnider and Register of Wills Joseph D. Brooks. It is assumed in Carroll county as a matter of course that Governor Smith will give the appointment to that county, although there is no law to prevent its going to Howard.

Governor Smith will be inaugurated on the second Monday of next January and will hold office for four years, and at an annual salary of \$4,500.

Comptroller Hering was elected for two years, at an annual salary of \$2,500, and will take charge of the office on the third Monday in January. He has the appointment of three or four clerks.

Attorney-General Rayner was elected for four years, at an annual salary o \$3,000, and may enter upon his duties as soon as he receives his commission. He will have a fund at his disposal for the employment of a clerk.

Uses For Corn Stalks.

Half a dozen years ago the farmer cor sidered the value of his corn crop to be practically terminated with the husking of the corn. What was left was worth a very small sum an acre as fodder. Many experimenters, however, working along different lines have established the value of the by-products of the corn crop, and there is now a home market where a far- any benefit from any of them. One day mer can get from \$3 to \$5 a ton for corn stalks, so that their value is now from \$6

The American Agriculturist recently gave the following list of what can be well.—ADDLPH L. MILLETT, Manchester, made from corn stalks: first, cellulose for packing coffer-dams on our ships; second, pyroxyline varnish; third cellulose for nitrating purposes for making smokeless powder and other explosives; fourth, as a packing material; fifth, for paper pulp and the various forms of paper made herefrom, both alone and mixed with other grades of paper stock; sixth, as a stock food made from the fine outer shells or shives of the corn stalks and also from the nodes, or joints. The leaves or tassels also furnish a shredded or bale fodder; seventh, mixed feeds for stock containing fine ground shell or shives as ; base and in addition thereto various nitrogenous materials and concentrated food substances, or blood, molasses, distillery and glucose refuse, sugar beet pulp, apple pomace and other by-products; and eighth, poultry foods.


