LETTER FROM MANILA. The following letter is from Private Fletcher O. Crawford, son of our well-

known citizen, William Crawford, near "We were marched to San Pedro Macati and camped there over night.

Next morning, about 3 o'clock, we breakfasted and went out to hunt the 'niggers.' We marched in a body for five miles, a great many of the boys falling aside from excessive heat before we met the insurgents, and then the shooting began. You could hear the zip and ping of the Remington and Mauser bullets, both of which the insurgents use. While the gunboats were shelling them from the bay we were ....\$1.00 gunning them from the hills. One of our officers, Colonel Smith, fell out in the start, and that was the last I ever

saw of him. We chased the insurgents like sheep, and ran them all over the country. In the afternoon we had another brush with them. We camped near Paranaque, and took possession of the town in the morning (Sunday), and rested until late in the afternoon, and then marched on to Las Pinas. We lost only two men killed and a few wounded We then marched back to Manila, fixed our things up and relieved the volun teers on the north line, at Caloocan and Malabon; thence south again, taking possession of the firing line at Pasay,


