MR. EDITOR: An anti-trust convention is to meet in Chicago on Feb. 12th, 1900. The National Rural and Family Magazine, published at 79 Dearborn St., Chicago, has undertaken to be the mouth-piece of those who are rallying in defense of our liberties,
