MILK.

Among the modern improvements in farming, the driry has of late years, been very much neglected So much of the profit of breeders depending upon the fa-cility with which the milk of the cow may be reserved during the suckling time of the calf, the following substitute, used in Germany, for the natural food of the young progeny, may be acceptable to our country readers:

Let as much water be heated on the fire as the calf will be disposed to drink; when it boils, throw one or two handfuls of oatmes!" into it, and after continuing in that state for one minute, take it off, and let it be cooled to the temperature of new milk, when one or two pints of skimmed milk are to be added to it. With this beverage the young animal will fatten and thrive pro digiously; the milk of the parent will be applied to the dairy, and the intelligent farmer will immediately discover the great advantage to be derived, in the produce of the dairy, from such an expedient.

Potaties preferable to a Summer fallow for Wheat.

Extract of a letter from the Rev. Samuel Austin, of Worcester, to the Editor of the Medical and Agricultural Regis ter; dated or Worcester, February

1806. "There is one species of husbandry, not in general practice, in which I have made some experiments with very con siderable success; that is, to substitute a erop of potatoes in the roam of a summer as a preparation for wheat. Wheat is doubtless the best and most profitable grain that can be raised. No species of vegetable adds so much ornament to a country, and none affords a more essential or grateful part of that aliment by which human nature is preserved. The potatoe also is a valuable root. For the horse it is an excellent and healthful substrute, for the green grass which he erops in his summer pasture, and seems nearly indispensable to be united with his dry winter fodder, to preserve him from those diseases to which he is so exposed in the cold season. Every intelligent farmer knows its value for feeding his swine, his sheep and his cattle; and no crop is more sure or more easily raised; none is so plenuful. Warm, loanty land, and such is the greatest part of this Com monwealth, well manured, will yield three hundred bushels to the acre. They mey be taken off, if planted in season, by the middle of September, and the ground will be in the best situation to put in immediately a crop of wheat. This is altogether better than summer fullowing, and the crop of potatoes is a clear saving. I have in this way, had 25 bushels of most excellent winter wheat on the acre. I have now a piece of land

We resolved to publish the sequel of the discussions and the investigation relative to expedition to the Isle of Walcheren, though the question is already stale, and no longer possesses any great interest. But this investigation is a monument of the ignorance of the English respecting those affeirs which most con-cern them. What! no plan of Antwerp to be had in London? What! are they ignorant of the situation of these dock yards, from which twelve sail of the line have been already launched, and eigh teen more are on the point of being laun ched? They know not, that since July 1803, when the emperor visited Antwerp, six millions have been expended upon the fortifications which were previously considerable : and that the left bank, and the Tete de Flandre, ere, protected by fortifications, so as to maintain the communications with France and covered by an inundation to the extent of 2000 toises.

" The English truly lay out their money to very little purpose. Lord Chatham knew nothing of the fortifications of Antwerp, but from masons who had worked there. Europe & France will see with astonishment the extent of the ignor. ance of the English They know not wheth er Cadsandhean is, and They are ignorant that thechannel which separated Cadsand from the Continent has been dry these five and twenty years, and that Cadsand is no longer an island. We may form an opinion how anxious the English are for peace, and how much they feel the want of it, by the sudden and extraordinary rise of funds, upon the first intelligence of an exchange of prisoners. They never rose higher in time of peace.
