

ted with a sufficient proportion of carbonic acid to render it soluble, I would judge for my own part that it would be sufficient.

I have often remarked, that chalybeates given in small doses, and often repeated, proved of more real service in delicate affections of the stomach, as dyspepsia, than large doses given under same circumstances; and I judge the principle to be the same in chalybeate waters, whether natural or artificial.—Supposing a bottle of water was to contain only three grains of iron, which is considered a pretty large quantity, (although the Ballstown contains four grains to the bottle,) and several bottles were consumed in the course of the day, immediately from the spring; the patient would then take a considerable quantity of metal in a few days, which, in consequence of its frequent use, would operate gradually on the tone of the stomach or other viscera; and by this, though slow process, would eventually perform a cure.

Cure for the Tooth-Ache.

An eminent apothecary in the vicinity of London, has lately recommended, as an effectual cure for the tooth ache, the following remedy, which he has been in the habit of using for many years, and out of the number of cases eight-tenths have succeeded, viz: to take three table spoonfuls of brandy, adding to it one drachm of camphire, with 30 or 40 drops of laudanum, and then dropping a little upon some lint, and applying it to the tooth affected, keeping the lint moistened for five minutes only on the tooth and gum.

Curious Calculations.

There are in London 502 places of worship; 1 Cathedral, 1 Abbey, 114 Churches, 130 Chapels and Chapels of ease, 207 Meetings and Chapels for Dissenters, 43 Chapels for Foreigners, and 6 Synagogues; about 4,050 public and private schools, including Inns of Court, Colleges, &c; about 8 societies for morals, 10 societies for learning and arts; 122 asylums for the sick; 17 asylums for the sick and lame; 13 dispensaries, and 704 friendly societies, charities distributed, 750,000 per annum.

There are about 2,500 persons committed for trial in one year. The annual depositions amount to about 2,100,000; and on the Thames, previous to the erection of the docks, 461,000.—There are 18 prisons, and 5,204 ale-houses within the bills or mortality.—The amount of coin counterfeited is 200,000l. per annum. About 9000 receivers of stolen goods; about 10,000 servants at all times out of place; 20,000 persons rise every morning without knowing how they are to subsist during the day.

London consumes annually 110,000 bullocks, 776,000 sheep and lambs, 210,000 calves, 200,000 hogs, 60,000 sucking pigs, 6,930,000 gallons of milk, the produce of 8,500 cows, 10,000 acres of ground cultivated for vegetables, 4000 acres for fruit, 700,000 quarters of wheat, 600,000 chaldrons of coals, 1,113,500 barrels, (34 galls.) of ale and porter, 11,146,782 gallons of spirituous liquors and compounds, 32,500 tons of wine, 16,600,000 pounds of butter, 31,100,000 pounds of cheese, and 14,000 boat loads of cod.

NEW YORK, July 11.

LATEST FROM CADIZ, &c.

We learn by the schr Weymouth, capt Howland, in 30 days from Teneriffe, that a few days before her departure, 2 Spanish and one English 74 with a transport ship having on board 800 French prisoners arrived at Santa Cruz from Cadiz, which place they left about the 1st June. They stated, that the Marquis de la Romana, with 80,000 troops were on their march in the rear of the French army towards Cadiz; and that the inhabitants of that place were in high spirits, and under no apprehensions of being obliged to surrender to the French.

We further learn, that the Seven Canary Islands were immediately to be placed under the Vice Royalty of the Duke del Parque, who with a number of troops was hourly expected at Santa Cruz.

It is further added by our informant, that so much were the inhabitants incensed against the French prisoners at Port Oratavia and the upper town, that they had emboldened and threatened to massacre all they could find; and that two respectable French inhabitants of the place had been put to death by the populace. About 100 of the regular troops came over from St Croix, and quelled the rioters.

Extract of a letter from a commercial House of the first respectability dated Liverpool, May 25, 1810.

"We are informed that Mr. Pinkney is at length in possession of the French decree, by which all American property is sequestered, as likewise the imperative order for all citizens of the U States to quit the French territories without delay under pain of imprisonment. This decree was passed as far back as the 23d

of March, but not published until the 8th of May. It is transmitted to all the northern powers for their adoption.

PHILADELPHIA, July 12.

From the True American.

Yesterday arrived brig Saunders, Quail from Cadiz, which she left the 29th May and informs that the French are erecting batteries & advancing their works at Matagorda; but had not opened them when he sailed, neither had there been any encounter or sally; on either side for some time previous to his sailing. On the 17th and 25th of May two of the prison ships ran ashore in gales of wind by which 6 or 700 French prisoners were released the boat of the British men of war attempted to board them while drifting and take out the prisoners but the Frenchmen having got arms in their hands kept them off killed 16 or 17 of the English; from which it is supposed that the one, on the 25th, having 4 or 500 prisoners, taking the advantage of the gale, had rose on their guards, seized their arms, cut the cables and let her drift on shore—the Frenchmen defended her till they were all landed, when the British set her on fire.

Capt Quail informs, that on the 20th of May the Spanish mountaineers, armed only with knives daggers and cutlasses, poured down on the town of Chirus (about 16 miles from the Isle of Leon) garrisoned by a body of French, whom they routed and cut to pieces, hardly leaving a man to tell their mistortunes. Capt Q. heard nothing of the battle in Portugal, or the evacuation of Madrid, as reported yesterday via Charleston.

From English papers received at the office of the Whig.

It should appear that all the enemies to Parliamentary Reform and the correction of abuses, are skulkers. In London, in Middlesex, and at Westminster, these poltroons did not dare to show themselves at the public meetings legally convened, and to oppose, with the manly character of Englishmen, the resolutions and petitions brought forward, but they sneak into holes and corners, and then come out with their counter-declarations. This is pusillanimity, and pusillanimity of the lowest and basest kind. As to the signatures of their famous declaration, what do those signatures exhibit but the names of a host of contractors, loan jobbers, money lenders, and money lovers; with a retinue of their needy dependents, such as are always to be found in shoals near the seat of government, and particularly near the seat of a government, whose annual expenditure is 76 millions a year. A declaration so obtained is worth as little as Mr. Canning's friendship, as Lord Chatham's military skill, as the marquis of Wellesley's plot, or as the researches of the Finance Committee nominated by the Right Hon Speaker Perceval.—(Leeds Mercury.)

From the London Statesman.

The following is extracted from the Rev. Mark Noble's continuation of Granger's Biographical History of England, vol. 1st, page 164. (Note.)

LORD CHIEF JUSTICE HOLT.

"In the Banbury cause he told the House of Peers, that they ought to respect the law which had made them so great, presiding over which, he should disregard any of their decisions; he would not even condescend to give them a reason for his conduct. In the same manner he set the Commons at defiance; they sent to demand reasons, he gave none.—The Speaker and a select number of the House, went in person to the Court of King's Bench; his answer was—"I sit here to administer justice—if you had the whole House of Commons in your belly, I should disregard you, and if you do not immediately retire, I will commit you, Mr. Speaker, and those with you; where there is a right," said he, "there is a remedy;" when it was urged that no injury could be done by a returning officer refusing a legal vote, he directed a satisfaction to be given against the sense of the other judges—neither his compeers nor the houses of parliament separately could bend, or even both of them collectively, intimidate him; his invincible courage was equalled only by his incorruptible integrity. Queen Ann was compelled to dissolve the parliament, that the acrimony between the two houses might cease.

The inexhaustible resources of this country are at length admitted, even by Mr. Rose and Mr. Huskisson, to be no longer capable of ministering to that wanton and shameless system of profusion so fatally introduced—and pursued with perseverance so obstinate, so blind, so inflated, from the moment that the first crusade against France was undertaken by the Heaven born Pitt. What must the admirers of this perpetual mistaking Statesman—the Pitt club Illuminati, think of the inexhaustible doctrine—when the opinion, of men so intimately acquainted as are Mr. Rose and Mr. Huskisson, with the pounds, shillings and pence, of our expenditure—at length succumb beneath the accumulating and overwhelming pressure of taxation. The tenor of the speeches of those gentlemen last night, in the committee on the army estimates, is *totidem verbis*—that we have arrived at the *ne plus ultra* of taxation! Have they not, for years, been warned of the approach and certain arrival of that period? "the great difficulty we have now to encounter, is, the failure of our finances!"—It required

not the intelligence of ministers to convince all thinking men of that fact; all such have seen, for years, the gradual approach of that calamity which seems so suddenly to have burst on the vision of ministers. To that economy, the necessity of which is now acknowledged, even by the very men who have assisted in bringing us to the brink of the precipice on which we stand, they have, for near twenty years, turned a deaf ear—constantly ridiculing the prophetic apprehensions of all those, to whom they now come with a whining discovery of the danger that stares us in the face!

Amidst the disasters with which we are surrounded, we have, however, the consolation of feeling the activity of some part of the Administration. No sooner was the vacancy of the Tellership ascertained, by the identification of the body of the late holders of that office than Mr. Perceval—in within even a few hours, laudably anxious that the public service should no longer suffer by the suspension of the duties of that important office—set off in a post chaise and four, for Windsor—from whence he returned at half past one in the morning—with the appointment in his pocket—who? Mr. Charles Yorke, member for the county of Cambridge!
