th the same. The council of Madeas usisted of four persons, at the head of hom was sir G: Barlow. Those who seented from him, were, by law, to tate their reas as in minutes to the court of directors. He wished to have there, as he understood Mr. Petrie, the second in council, did object to the mea-sures pursued. His (Mr. Petric's) opinions too, were of some weight, as compared with sir G, Barlow's; for he had been 44 years at Madres, while the lat ter had only been two or three. The only remaining papers for which he should move, were such as would show how these matters had been viewed by the court of directors and the government at home. This was more necessary, as the court of directors had divided in equal numbers on the question, whether sir G. Barlow or Mr Petrie · hould be recalled? and the accidental issue was the sending Mr. Petrie to ano-Some of the direc ther government tors had protested against this, and he wished to have these protests, to see on what their opinions were founded These were all the papers he now wanted; but, he tru ted, should any other appear to be necessary during the course of this inquiry, he would be permitted to call for them. The hon, gentleman concluded by moving for the mass of pipers above mentioned, being copies of all cor-respondence between the commander in chief, and the governor in council at Madras, directing the arrest of lieut. Mr. Henry Mon'gomery seconded the

motion. He deprecated the mode of conduct adopted by the government of Madras. If such practices as that gov ernment liss countenspeed and sanctioned were exercised in this country, a re volution would be inevitable.

Mr. 1 . "das spoke at some length in reply-he was friendly to part of the motion, but could not agree to produce all the papers.]
Lord Archibald Hamilton conceived

that all papers at all relating to the subject, should be produced. It was impos sible that after the frauds and tyrannies which had been practiced at Madras, that country did not feel a soreness and aversion to the government, which it required all the exertion of that house to ameliorate. He would wish to know by what means minis era became possesses of the papers respecting that government which tkey then had? He conceived that the papers of sir G. Barlow had not been transmitted legally. India, which could only be supported by truth and justice. called aloud for the interposition of this government, and her prayers for aid could not be refused.

Sir Thomas Turton, it had been men tioned that sir G. Barlow had acted firmly in his government. It was possible that the government of Madras, like the government at home, was firm in opposing every thing in which the public interest was concerned. He conceived that the people there must be dis gusted with the government over them, in proportion to the disgust which the English government had excited in libe ral and enlightened p ople. It had been cald that anchymous remonstrances had been made; but was it not known that punishment awaited the man who could boldly utter his sentiments? These ap plications failed, and the consequence was rebellion. He heartily wished that our pessessions in India were gone; they were a loadstone round the nack of the country, and would at length, suc ceed in sinking her. Until papers, ex-culpatory of sir G. Barlow's conduct were brought forward, he would contiare to think unfavorably of him.

#### NATURAL HISTORY.

Mr. Neill lately read before the Wernerian Natural History Society extracts from different authors to show the existence of the great Snake of the Northern Ocean, and concluding by stating, that within a few weeks, a vast marine animal, shaped like a snake, and not described in the works of systematic naturalists, had been cast ashore in Orkney. -This curious animal, it appears, was stranded in Rothesholm bay, in the island of Stronso (coast of Scotland). The creature was dead when it came on shore, and the tail seemed to have been injured and broken by dashing among The body measured fiftyfive feet in length, and the circumference of the thickest part was equal to the girth of on Orkney poney. The head was not larger than that of a seal and was furnished with two blow holes .-From the back a number of filaments resembling in texture the substance called Indien sea grass, hung down like a mane. On each side of the body were three large fins, shaped like paws, and joined. Before measures could be taken for securing this rare animal for the inspection of naturalists, a violent tempest unfortunately occurred, and beat the carcase to pieces.
