On application to Dorchester county of the Samuel Smoot, of the county aforesaid, by petition in writing, praying the benefit of the general assembly of Maryland, for the relief of sundry inscisent debtors, passed at November session, eigheren hondred and live, and the several upplementary acts thereto, on the terms mentioned in the acts; a sciedule of his property and a list of his creditors on oath as feral he can ascertain them as directed by the said acts being at nexed to his petition; and the said court being satisfied by competent testimony, that the said Samuel Smoot has resided the two preceding years within the state of Maryland.
