both wise and proper t because it was truth, and a truth which it was not nory to tell, because it is probable the British minister was as well acquainted with our mulitary condition as the president himself.

The remainder of this dispatch treats more generally of the sentiments ex-pressed by Mr. Madison; and Mr. Er akine declares that he "believes them to be his real sentiments," and refers to " certain private important communica tione," which have been made to him by members of the administration, who are sincerely desirous of a conciliation with Great Britain.

Thus far the dispatch of Mr. Erskine, No 1. The dispatch No. 1L is appropriated by Mr. Erskine to the communications of Mr. Gallatin almost exclusively, and whatever is contained in it relative to Mr. Madison, proceeds wholly from Mr. Gallatin, and must be considered in that way.

There is no further note of any conversation of Mr Madison until we reach No VIII Mr Erskine's dispatch of the 16th March, 1809, which so far from being exceptionable, is highly creditable to the president, fixes at once the principles of his conduct, to be conformable strictly to the rule svowed to the two belligerents.

Upon a review, therefore, of what relates to the conversations of Mr. Madeson himself, as reported by Mr Erskine, we must draw a line of discrimination between them and the reports of his opinions, as they are stared by Mr. Erskire to have been uttered by Mr Gallatin, and must declare that so far as the policy adopted was wise and just, so far the conduct of Mr. Madison was consistent and correct.

From the National Intelligencer.

Having observed in the Freeman's Journal of the 21st inst. several extracts from other papers exhibited as proofs of my having been recalled from New Orleans to answer for having detained French vessels, it is a duty I owe to go vernment and myself, to state, that the impression is erroneous. It never has been intimated to me that government disapproved of the measures I adopted to enforce the laws of my country

My return to the Atlantic states has been, as I am convinced, only in compliance with my repeated applications to the Navy Department for that indulgence, the first of which was as far back as the 26th May, 1809, and if at any time I had entertained an idea that depended on, or was the result of any disapprobamy conduct, the manner in which I have been received by the Se cretary of the Navy would be quite sufficient to remove any such apprehension.

The vessels I captured were tried and defended in the district court of Orleans, and if I have not shewn probable cause for seizure, I consider myself bound to make good the damages in a fecuniary way, and no other.

The stock in trade at Astracan, was reckoned 20 years ago from 3 to 5 millions of rou bles. Mhinatschin, the Chinese town is at a very small distance from Kiatchta. The commerce with Persia might easily be put in a very flourishing state. To increase the activity of this commerce upon the Volga, above a hundred colonial settlements were made, among which, one of the Moravian brethren was distinguished by the great variety of his manufactures. Nor had the Russi ans forgotten likutsk, which can command the trade at Kischts, that of the more easterly part of Siberia and that of Russia. And of the trade of this place it is said that its activity depends on the merchants who inhabit it. The mer ceants win venture into the seas between Siberia and America chiefly belong to this place, and we are told their houses display the furniture obtained from China. The Tea from China by Russia has been preferred to that by sea from Canton. It remains then for Russia as well as America to appreciate its own resour ces at this time. when the liberty of the ocean is no more. Salem Reg.




