**INVENTION.**

Mr. J. Minor, an ingenious mechanic of Ballston, has obtained a patent for an improved water wheel, (his invention) which is so constructed as to supersede the necessity of a dam—the wheel is intended to be immersed in any stream or current of water, which runs with required rapidity, or in situations where it may receive the action, either of the flux or reflux of the tide; to be placed in a horizontal shaft—the floats extending in radii from the shaft, at right angles thereto, increasing in width from the shaft to their extremities, with their flat surfaces inclined towards the line of the shaft; in this respect it resembles the sails of a wind-mill or the fly of the smoke-jack, receiving motion from the water in the same manner those do from the current of air; the inclination of the floats to be according to the strength of the current. — The inventor has kept a prudent eye on possible contingencies, and constructed his machinery to meet their effects.

**LATEST FROM LISBON.**

Capt Davis, of the General Johnson, arrived here yesterday from Lisbon informs, that there had been several skirmishes between the out posts of the combined English and Portuguese, & French armies, but no important battle had taken place. — though it was hourly expected. No apprehensions were entertained that the French would get possession of Lisbon for the present. Letters received by the above arrival state "That cargoes of American produce can be sent there to a good market, and with perfect safety, at least, to the end of the present year." — The last accounts received at Lisbon, from Cadiz, mentioned that they were under no apprehension of the French. — Flour was sold at 24 dollars.

**FROM A LONDON PAPER.**

**CHEVALIER DEON.**

In the vast range of biographical history, from the earliest period down to the present time, there never perhaps, has been found a combination of events so remarkable—an assumption of the character so various and in many cases directly opposite, as in the life of this most extraordinary personage. After having sustained for the first fifty years, and in the most distinguished manner, the characters of a scholar, a soldier and a statesman, we suddenly and unexpectedly find M D'Eon assuming the dress, and apparently with great reluctance submitting to be taken for a woman; and it is not till upwards of thirty years afterwards, that, on his death-bed, are verified beyond the possibility of doubt his claims to the personal as well as mental distinctions of a man.

The body of this extraordinary character has undergone not only the anatomical inspection of the whole faculty, but also of many hundreds of the most distinguished curiosity of the metropolis. Strange to say, the female visitants have exceeded those of the other sex as three to one. His highness the duke of Gloucester and several other persons of distinction were among the latter. It lies in a handsome casket covered with black cloth and a black velvet cross on the lid, at the house of Mrs. Cole, in new Millman street, to whose benevolent kindness and attention the chevalier was indebted for the principal comforts of his latter days. A cast was taken from the face on Friday. It is proposed to inter the body in St Pancras Churchyard the day after tomorrow. The chevalier had completed the 84th year of his age.

The declaration now made of the sex of this generally supposed female character is likely to give rise to several actions for the recovery of sums unjustly paid by various underwriters on the faith given to a certificate, after an examination of surgeons 55 years ago; several of these duped paymasters being still alive to reclaim such sums, and many of the payees also remaining in existence to answer such demands of re-payment. It may be remembered, that immediately after this pecuniary speculation was detected, the Chevalier assumed the female

habit, which to keep up the imposture, was worn to the day of his death!

Larcom, of Beverly, Mr Very and Mr Irwin, of Salem—Treadwell of Ipswich, & Mr. G Leith, died on board the boat.—The above mentioned persons taken from the boat, were landed yesterday at Cape Ann.—They had been in the boat 37 days after having staid by the ship 17 days from her being upset.—The whole number left on the wreck was 31 including this boat's crew 10 only of whom remained alive when they left her; and those in such a deplorable situation, having nothing to subsist on, as to be incapable of sustaining life much longer, unless relieved. Messrs Junvalin J. Merrill, and E Marshall of Newburyport, J. Fowler, Beverly; and W Burrell, H Tucker, B. Peck, E Wingate, Sinclair, and N S Sheffield, were left on board the ship alive. The following persons had died, viz. J Choate, G Carpenter, G Prince, G Perry, M Orton, J Jones P Gill, J Brackley, S Craft, G Cogswell, J Brown, D. Cokhill, S Vallei, L Josias, H Wilson & G Jones.

Capt Davis understood from the persons whom he had thus fortunately relieved, that then they left the ship, she had nearly gone to pieces—and that unless the crew were soon relieved from their deplorable situation, they must inevitably perish.
