From the Aurora.
I am not, sir, an apologist for any outrage on our rights, whether committed by France or England; but I may very dispassionately enquire why such a lamentation is made about the disrespect for our flag which France has lately evinced—To judge of any thing dispassionately, I often change the parties, and use the arguments of the one for the other. Thus I put the arguments of the British in the hands of the French; and the arguments of the French in the hands of the British; and I am then able to see how they would respectively act or speak concerning the same principles urged by another, which they have themselves urged or acted upon. So when I hear these complaints of the late seizures in France, I ask what were the complaints made upon seizures for years past in England. When I hear these complaints about our merchant flag, I ask what complaints are made about our national flag. I remember the universal agreement in indignation on the outrage of the Chesapeake, and when I saw the missions of Erskine, Rose and Jackson, all close in a humiliating refusal to give us reparation, I am not surprised at the contempt with which France has also treated us. "Like begets like," says the proverb.

Was not this contempt for our flag long ago predicted? Was it not the absolute and necessary effect of our own insignificance in the eyes of mankind?—Our flag, indeed! and what should be the character of a national flag? It should be as precious to the country at large, as honor to a female: and have we maintained that precious character? Have we not barely looked on at its violation under our own roof? Have we not permitted it to be prostituted in every quarter of the globe? Has it not been for years in the keeping of smugglers and swindlers in Europe? Yet, although we must all answer, to our shame, in the affirmative, we hear people prate about our insulted flag, and express astonishment that Bonaparte does not respect that, upon which we place no honorable estimation ourselves, which we have basely and scandalously suffered to be disgraced, and have, as the correspondence of Erskine shews, not merely overlooked but followed up by courting the carcasses of the nation that disgraced us. Morals and honor as precious to a nation as to an individual.

We know that our flag has been degraded; we have taken no measures to prevent it; British ministers do not think the fact of sufficient moment to be concealed, they avow that our flag has enabled them to deceive Bonaparte. Mr. Erskine expressly exhibits the partial effects of our impartial non-intercourse laws; if as is reported, the correspondence which Mr. Gallatin possessed in April, was also in possession of the

French gave content at the same time, can we be any longer surprised at the seizure of our ships; the allegations of Mr. Gallatin to Mr. Erskine, concerning the former president and the present; the allegation of Mr. Secretary Smith to Mr. Erskine, that we were prepared to go to war with France; these alone are circumstances which could not but impress upon the minds of the French government; or upon the minds of any other men of ordinary senses, that the government of the U. States was either bowed down by the fear of England, corrupted by her gold, or that there was neither intellect nor honesty in the government. What respect could our flag hope for, even independent of the law of the 1st of March, 1809, which is another of the Machiavelian offspring of Mr. Gallatin's prolific faculty for remote and concealed perfidy; without regard even to this ridiculous and preposterous law, how could we expect our flag to be respected, who exhibited in such form the depravity of one or of all our administrations; there is no alternative, it will live in history, one only or all alike.

It is folly then to complain after having invited indignity all round. But, of all things the most astonishing is, that the very men who, who first violated our flag, and who after abusing it themselves hired it for wages to others, should now that it is labouring under the effects of prostitution, talk of its purity, and wonder that the French will have nothing to do with it!

NEW YORK, July 26.
LATEST FROM CADIZ.
Capt. Bolon, who arrived at this port yesterday, in 53 days from Cadiz, informs that about the 25th of May a battle was fought by the English and Portuguese armies, against the French, in which the latter were defeated.—The communication between the besieging army of Cadiz and Madrid was cut off. The English troops in Cadiz were preparing on the 2d of June to make a sortie on the French, in consequence of the news of their defeat on the frontiers of Portugal, expecting that the British and Portuguese army would attack the French troops besieging Cadiz.

The bombardment of Matagorda from an opposite fort was so severe that the French had dismounted their cannon at that place, and the people in Cadiz were in very high spirits, and in full expectation of getting rid of their invaders. Flour was 20 dolls but the recent arrivals of four American vessels had reduced the price.

Extract of a letter from a Merchant in Lisbon to another in this city, dated the 3th of June received via Boston.
"The British and Portuguese are nearly 100,000 strong and in high spirits. The Marshal Massena, has arrived at Salamanca and taken command of the French army, and is to be made Vice Roy of Portugal, in case he succeeds in subduing it. Cadiz still holds out, and has a sufficient force to stand a long siege. An insurrection has broke out in the Island of Minorca the Spaniards being dissatisfied in some commercial restrictions, and wished to put the Island under the government of the English. The Spaniards have sent 3000 men to quell the insurrection."

The U. S. frigate Constitution, capt. Hull, from Boston, anchored in Hampton Roads on Monday. Thursday last, passed a British frigate of 32 guns, bound to New York.
