I do therefore order and adjudge, that the said Robert Cutts, be discharged from imprisonment, and that by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in some one of the public newspapers in the city of Baltimore, every other day for three months successively, or by serving a copy of this order on each of his creditors individually, before the twenty-seventh day of October next, he give notice to his creditors to appear before the said county court at the court-house of said county, at ten o'clock in the forenoon of the said day, for the purpose of recommending a trustee for their benefit, and to shew cause if any they have why the said Robert Cutts should not have the benefit of the said act and supplements as prayed.
