

Masters with fortunes, honors turn with climes,
Tenets with books, and principles with times
This truth is illustrated by the history of two measures, which were urged upon General Washington, by Alexander Hamilton. It is well known that the latter gentleman was a warm friend of the British treaty, and of the bank of the U. S. &c.

When in the year '96 the House of Representatives called upon the president for certain papers, connected with the treaty, the application was rejected—After dwelling at some length on the subject, the president thus proceeds—

"If other proofs than these, & the plain letter of the constitution itself, be necessary to ascertain the point under consideration, they may be found in the journals of the general convention which I have deposited in the office of the department of state. In these journals it will appear that a proposition was made, 'that no treaty should be binding on the U. States, which was not ratified by a law,' and that the proposition was expressly rejected."

But how does this doctrine stand in another instance? When the Bank Bill was before the P. U. S. for his signature, the secretary of the treasury "remembered to forget," "that a power to grant charters of incorporation had been proposed in the general convention and rejected."

In the one case the rejection of a proposition by the convention is thought good ground for acting against it—in the other, the precedent is forgotten; both convention and constitution are thrown out of view.

We have seen letters from Havana, dated the 8th inst. which contain the following interesting particulars.

The San Lorenzo and San Fulgencio, Spanish ships of the line, arrived at Havana on the 7th, in 50 days from Cadix. On board the latter was passenger Licut. Gen. Alava, who had taken charge of his office as captain general of Marines of the island. It is said that the General brought out with him artificers for the purpose of proceeding in building immediately another arsenal, ships of the line, frigates, &c.—Three more ships of the line were hourly expected, on board of one of which is Licut. Gen. Eredia, who is appointed Governor of Havana and general of the island, to supersede the Marquis de Someruelos. He is said to be a man of great personal bravery, of talents and decision. He was formerly captain of the king's guards, and brother to a general now in the Spanish army.

We learn from captain Morgan, of the schooner John, from Coro, that a revolution had taken place on the Spanish Main. That Laguna and Porto-Cavello acknowledged Ferdinand the 7th, but not the authority of the Regency, which the province of Coro and Maracaibo have to the utmost extension; and apprehensive of an attack from the former, they were concentrating their forces; and 20,000 men marched from Maracaibo to join those of Coro.

Inland Improvements.—The committee, appointed by the New York Legislature to explore the most practicable route for improving the inland navigation from Hudson's river to Lake Ontario and Lake Erie, have entered upon the duties of their appointment. Important results are expected.

I see in the paper of this morning, some remarks respecting the debt due me from the estate of George Dent. The author must be ignorant of the nature of my demand, or willfully suppress the truth. The nature and circumstances of my claim are shortly these:—George Dent and myself were a short time concerned in business; some time after the close of it, he made out and gave to me a statement in his own handwriting of the balance due to me, which is now in my possession, and any one may see it. About this balance we never had the least difference, nor was I disposed to sue him, as I believe had he lived, I should have been paid long ago. After his death I found it necessary to sue Walter Simpson, the administrator of his estate; and he thought it right to avail himself of the law of limitation in the first suit—and, because I had waited more than three years for my money, I was told I should not be paid, as I could not pay me within that time, and my suit failed—I renewed it as soon as possible, and the like plea was resorted to again; but as I was told proved defective, and I obtained a verdict and judgment in the year 1804, for my debt and interest, making together £250. Walter Simpson then removed the suit to the Court of Appeals, where it has been kept, unsettled until the last setting of that court in June last. My judgment was then affirmed, and that court allowed me interest on it from the time it was obtained in the County Court, amounting to 4 95 more and the costs—and after all I have been obliged to give an execution to the sheriff to get my money—Can any person blame me?
