By this day's Mail.

The expectations interesting news by the late arrival New-York, induced us to delay this morning's paper.

Intelligence had been received by our government several weeks ago, that Mr. Pinkney is negotiating a treaty with the British government. Perhaps the "important dispatches" alluded to contain it. Ad no doubt, we will receive all the blessings of British protection, if we continue to submit; to sacrifice our honour of commerce to her interest, and go to war with France—Whether the relinquishment of her piracy is to be on condition of concessions from us, a little time will tell.

Wheat, at Liverpool, was fir 16s, and 6d. to 17s. bushel (70 lbs.) and that it must rate high for considerable time, and that the crops were their receiving great damage from the dryness of the season which had prevailed. Cotton 14 and a half to 15d. Turpentine 20s.

It is very probable that the gentleman who received the late English papers, at New York, has withheld valuable information from the public.

Ship William Watson, 23 days from Baltimore, for Tomingen, was spoken June 16th, lat. 55, long. 24.

Buonaparte's decree is said to be for the condemnation and sale of all colonial property in the port of France, and is issued on the supposition that none could be brought into those ports, except by British license.

Benefits accruing to the U. S. from encouraging and harbouring British agents & spies in our commercial towns illustrated—by practice.

Boston, July 30.—Arrived the pilot boat Good Intent, capt. Coe, from Halifax, in 4 days. A slip, supposed to be a Packet from England, was going in as she came out. The American ship in a sho, carried in, was cleared on a coast promise. The Felicity was libelled, but it was thought would not be brought to trial; as the Colonial Court was believed not to have jurisdiction of the case—Trial must take place, we understand, at all, within 21 days of the date of the libel, which was about July 25.

The Felicity was from the Cape of Good Hope and when captured, was 70 days out.

From the Exchange Coffee House.

The Felicity was captured on the 10th July at 10 o'clock A. M. by the British scht Shamrock, Lieut. Croke. He merely enquired the ship's name and the captain's, and ordered her to accompany him to Halifax, without examining a single paper.

Halifax, July 22.

"We owe our misfortune to the misrepresentation of some villain, who wrote from Boston by the schr—, capt. Ellis. "That the ship Felicity, capt. Newell, was daily expected from the Isle of France, loaded with salt petre, "French property" This false information was contained in a letter to the "Chief officer of his majesty's customs," under three envelopes, addressed in three different disguised hands, and signed "a Briton," and added, "that in case the ship was taken and condemned he should expect a recompence."

On the 5th of June in the British House of Lords, Lord Sandwich moved for a return of "all the ships of the line and other ships of war which have been supplied with means of counteracting destruction by submarine bombs, clock work, machines or trigger torpedoes." He said in experiments in England on the subject £10,000 had been supplied Mr. Fulton, and 15,000 were granted as a reward. The motion was negatived.

Many distinguished members of parliament are endeavouring to ameliorate the laws of the country that provide for the punishment of criminals, and obtain the establishment of penitentiary houses as in the United States.

The arrangement by which British ships are admitted at Buenos Ayres are represented (by accounts from there to March 1) to be of a temporary nature.

NEW YORK, August 2.

Latest from England.

On Tuesday afternoon, the fast sailing brig Tamaahmah, capt Story, arrived at Hurl Gate, from Liverpool, which port she left on the 24th of June, and has brought advices about 3 weeks later than before received.

Geo. W. Erving, esp. late American charge des affairs in Spain, came home in the above vessel, and is the bearer of dispatches from our minister at the Court of St James, to the secretary of State, and we understand will proceed with them this morning.

On the 19th of June parliament was prorogued: Sir Francis Burdett was on that day liberated from the Tower.—There were great rejoicings among the parizans, and it is said a more numerous assemblage of people in the streets of London than took place when he was committed.

We do not learn whether any change in our affairs with Great Britain had taken place: But it has been rumoured, that the emperor Napoleon has issued a decree for the capture and condemnation of all the American property he can get hold of.

The editors of the Mercantile Advertiser have been furnished with the following partial extracts from a file of London papers to the 23d of June.

The Tamaahmah did not bring any letters or newspapers, as we are informed, except for the owners.

London, June 7.

The proceedings in both Houses of Parliament last night were interesting. The Catholic question was discussed in the House of Lords, and rejected by a majority of 85. In the House of Commons two petitions were presented from Berkshire. One praying for a reform in parliament was received. The other, against the imprisonment of John Gale Jones and Sir F. B. de la, and praying for their release was rejected after a sharp debate, on the ground of the petition being insulting to the House.

June 15.

Dutch papers arrived this morning to the 16th. They are not important. We hear of much activity in all the ports of which France has possession.

June 20.

This town is now all bustle. It has been increasing since 12 o'clock, and promises an immense crowd in the course of the day. The people in the line through which the procession is to pass are shutting their shops, and the company already assembling to take their stations on the balconies, and at the windows. Bands with narrow bones and clevens, with blue cockades, and motica, complimentary to the Baronet, are parading the streets. About one o'clock, a party of about 500, from Soho, with blue cockades and colours flying, proceeded down Catharine street and the Strand, for the City. They marched two and two, and invited every passenger whom they met to join them. At Catherine street they were met by the 12th Light Dragoons, on their way to Hyde Park Corner. The music of the former was playing St. Patrick's Day. The band of the Dragoons immediately struck up "God save the King."—The 14th Light Dragoons have followed the 13th; both regiments mustered very strong. The Bloomsbury, and other Volunteer corps, have been out this morning, but have been dismissed, with orders to be in readiness to muster again in the evening if necessary.

The freemen belonging to the several Insurances, are also parading the streets, with music.—They act as constables.

The crowd at the Tower, and at Sir Francis Burdett's house, in Piccadilly, is immense.

June 21.

Some of the letters by the Lisbon mail state, that Massena on being sent for to act against Portugal, was ordered to conquer that country which was in future to be his kingdom.

Plymouth, June 15.

Dispatches arrived on Wednesday from London, which were immediately sent on board a cartel for Morlaix. They relate to an exchange of prisoners, and probably contain a final answer of government. There is every reason to believe that a cartel will be immediately arranged.

Guttenburg June 1.

The whole Baltic fleet has passed the Belt with a fair wind, without making a single prize.

By a private ship we have communication from Hamburg dated 1st inst. stating the capture of a French privateer, and her prize (an American ship) cut out of the Port of Rostock.
