Tenets with books, and principles with times This truth is illustrated by the history of two measures, which were urged up-on General Washington, by Alexander Hamilton. It is well known that the latter gentleman was a warm friend of the British treaty, and of the bank of the U.

When in the year '96 the House of Representatives, called upon the president for certain papers, connected with the treaty, the application was rejected -After dwelling at some length on the Subject the president thus proceeds-If other proofs than these, & the plain fetter of the constitution itself, be necessary to ascertain the point under conside ration, they may be found in the journals of the general convention which I have deposited in the office of the department of state. In these journels it will appear that a proposition was made, " that no treaty should be be binding on the U. States, which was not ratified by a laiv, and that the proposition was expressly rejected"

But linw does this doctrine stand in an other; instance? When the Bank Bill was before the P. U.S. for his signature, the secretary of the treasury "remem-bered to forget," "that a power to grant charters of incorporation had been proposed in the general convention and rejected."

In the one case the rejection of a pro position by the convention is thought good ground for acting against it-in the other, the precedent is forgotten; both convention and constitution are thrown out of view.

The reader will remember the shocking sequel.

Here it is clearly seen, as in a glassa, that no condition in life can give content ment to a man whose mind is totally out of health.

." He may be rich, Or deck'd with regal honours ; but if joy Be absent from him, if he tastes them not ' lis useless grandeur all, and empty shale.'

Here too is seen the insatiable restless termenting nature of Avatice, and also a striking specimen of its horrible effects among men. What availed it Ahab that he was decked with gold and silver, that he was cloathed in purple and fine linen, and fared sumptuously every day. What did it avail him that he had men-servants and maid-servants, that he dwelt in a palace, sat on a throne, ruled a kingdom, and hed every comfort and luxury the world could afford; what it avail him when Avarice had got ful! possession of his heart? This tormenting made him completely miserable, notwithstanding all his wealth and grandeur

and it hurried him on, as it has hurried on many thousand others, to robbery

Finally, we here learn the necessity of checking all inordinate cravings, of repressing and extinguishing all improper desires of worldly gain, and of being content with the circumstances in life which Providence has alloted us. The divine command, "Thou shall not covet," im-I'ses a restraint on one of the most powciful and fatal propensities of the human Leatt : nor can we lay any claim to real in the life to come or contentment in the present life, if we knowingly permit ourselves to everleap this sacred barrier
